Note on Parliamentary Procedure

The 2023 FAWCO Biennial Conference is taking place in Bratislava, Slovakia from March 23-26. The rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the Biennial Conference in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with our Bylaws and Administrative Guidelines.

FAWCO Member Clubs are entitled to send up to three (3) delegates to a Biennial Conference. Each Club has one vote, which is cast by the FAWCO Representative. If they are unable to serve, then the Club President, or another Club member who has been approved as the appointed representative, will cast the vote. If Member Clubs are unable to send a delegate to the Biennial Conference, they may send in a vote, in writing, on the matters submitted to them, prior to the Meeting.

Although the Board of Directors, Counselors, Committee and Task Force Chairs, Liaisons, Regional Coordinators, FAWCO Foundation, FAUSA and all club participants and Individual Members have no voting rights, they may participate fully in all Biennial Conference floor discussions.

If you wish to speak during a floor discussion, please wait to be recognized by the Chair, and for the microphone to be brought to you. Before proceeding with your remarks, **state the name of your Club and your name.**

Please address all remarks through the Chair. Discussion by an individual on any question will be limited to one comment of two minutes duration. If a motion is made, it must be seconded before discussion is allowed. Any amendments proposed and seconded must be voted on (in reverse order) before the vote on the original motion. No more than two amendments can be on the floor at the same time. The maker of a motion may answer any questions posed, may withdraw the motion, and may speak again in rebuttal and in conclusion.

For voting purposes, each delegation has been provided with a club sign. When voting, please raise your sign clearly and wait for completion of the count before lowering it.

FAWCO Officers' Reports

President's Report

After three years of pandemic related disruption, FAWCO and our member clubs were eventually able to resume regular activities in 2022. We got off to a false start with our planning for an Interim Meeting in March 2022 and had to postpone the in-person event in Luxembourg until May. A full report on our Interim Meeting Part 1 (virtual) & Part 2 (in person) can be found within this Annual Report.

Banking Issues were an acute problem in 2022. Because FAWCO is a not-for-profit charitable corporation established in New York, with a leadership that changes every two years, FAWCO has encountered a variety of challenges over the years. We were hopeful in January 2022 that we had successfully updated our account details with our main bank, adding the current President and Treasurer to, and removing previous board members from, our US-based account; however, by the end of the year we were informed that the bank would no longer be able to serve our organization as none of our signatories lived in a state where the bank had branches. We faced many challenges in trying to get set up with another bank, but luckily by this point Treasurer Cathy Farnan had repatriated and thus satisfied the residency requirement. For this reason, a new Bylaw Amendment will be proposed at this conference to allow for the election of a FAWCO Treasurer who lives in the US at the time of election. As a result of research done to resolve the acute crisis, FAWCO also was able to pursue an additional opportunity which will be announced at this conference. I would especially like to thank Cathy for her exceptional work and dedication to address and resolve FAWCO's banking issues.

Appointments – 2022 has seen a variety of new appointments and shuffled positions. During the May Interim Meeting, UN Liaison Laurie Richardson (AWA Vienna) announced that she would be stepping down. As a result of the opening of the position, Alexandra Vo (FAUSA) made the decision to move into the UN role. Amanda Drollinger (AWC Central Scotland) took on the role of Target 5 Environment Chair, and Sheila Doucet (AAWE Paris) and Jocelyn Fitzgerald (AILO Florence) accepted the role of Environment Co-Chairs.

Two new regional coordinators, Cynthia Holden (AWC Central Scotland, RC Region 1) and Ellen Delman (AWC Zürich, RC Region 6) were appointed, as was a new Club Workshops Coordinator, Lyla Taylor (AWC Zürich). Deborah Hadley (AIWC Düsseldorf) and Rebekkah Klingshorn (Heidelberg IWC) were appointed the new Health Co-Chairs. Ann Birot-Salsbury (AAWE Paris) and Tracy Moede (AWC Hamburg) were named US Tax & Banking Co-Chairs. Bev Bachmayer (AWC Vienna) and Connie Phlipot (AWC Vienna) were named Conference Co-Chairs for the Bratislava Biennial Conference.

Membership – FAWCO was excited to welcome the International Women's Club of Moldova in June of 2022. Unfortunately, in 2021 the American Women's Club of Curaçao and the American International Women's Association of Marrakesh ceased formal operations and thus did not renew their memberships for 2022. Although normal operations have ceased for the American Women's Organization of Moscow, and many of their members left the country because of the war in Ukraine, the club has asked to remain a member in hopes of a more peaceful future.

Resolutions & Recommendations Chair Laurie Richardson and her committee worked to prepare R&Rs for 2023-25, and the Nominating Committee, led by Chair My-Linh Kunst (AWC Berlin), met and has submitted a slate of candidates for the 2023-25 FAWCO Board.

Regional and other Meetings - In August, I was able to travel to Vienna and Bratislava with Conference Co-Chair Bev Bachmayer (AWA Vienna), and we were able to tour and approve the Crowne Plaza as the conference hotel. Immediately following that trip, I finally succumbed to COVID-19 myself.

I attended and spoke at the Region 4 Regional Meeting November 4-6 in The Hague with a theme of Time to Make a YOU Turn. Thirty-five members attended the meeting, and 50 were present for a reception hosted by the new US Ambassador to the Netherlands, Shefali Rhazdan Duggal. Representatives from AWC Amsterdam, AWC Antwerp, AWC Brussels, AWC The Hague, as well as AWA Aquitaine, AWC Central Scotland, AIWC Düsseldorf, AAWE Paris and FAUSA attended. The FAWCO Board then held their fall Face 2 Face Board meeting in De Haan, Belgium at the invitation of former VP Member Clubs, Rozanne Van Rie. Unfortunately, due to a family funeral, I had to cancel plans to attend the Region 5 meeting in Frankfurt. **UN Liaison** – Alexandra Vo (FAUSA) organized a FAWCO for CEDAW panel discussion in October, hosted by Jessica Buchleitner (Munich IWC), with panelists Dr. Gail James, Elahe Amani and Pam Perraud (FAUSA). The recording is now available to the public on FAWCO's YouTube Channel. Alexandra, Environment Co-Chair Sheila Doucet (AAWE Paris), and FAWCO UN Rep Ayuska Motha (AIWC Cologne) represented FAWCO at COP27 in Sharm-el-Sheik, Egypt in November and hosted an online panel discussion about the event, which will also be repeated in part in Bratislava.

Data Protection and Privacy – I reviewed and updated FAWCO material relating to the European GDPR regulations and hosted a virtual meeting with VP Communications, Ann Marie Morrow (AWC Finland) and FAWCO Web Manager Cat Conner (AWC Hamburg) for Club Board Members and volunteers responsible for GDPR, privacy and copyrights in their own clubs. As part of our GDPR compliance, FAWCO not only requests permission to take and publish photos from conferences, but also requests permissions from FAWCO volunteers through a FAWCO Volunteer Data form.

FAWCO Programs – The FAWCO Target Program Health concluded in March 2022 with an exceptional fundraising result of \$177,000 for the benefit of Hope for Girls and Women Tanzania (HGWT). Rhobi Samwelly, founder of HGWT, was honored to be named an inaugural Human Rights Defender designation from the French government. With the training she received as part of that program she continues her work to eliminate the practice of Female Genital Mutilation in Tanzania and worldwide. The FAWCO Youth Cultural Volunteers Program was impacted by COVID-19 restrictions, but eventually held a successful program in Amsterdam, The Netherlands. FAWCO's Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging Team has continued to evolve, exploring a variety of ways that those in FAWCO organizations might proactively incorporate the ideals of inclusivity.

Publications – As President, I prepare and distribute the bulletin, *Connections* – *Letter from Headquarters* four times a year, and this year they went out in March, June, August and November. Additionally, I contribute to the monthly *News in Brief*.

As a two-term FAWCO President, my time has been overshadowed by the pandemic and challenged by a need to be creative and flexible as we all continued to work to support FAWCO's goals. I am beyond grateful for the resilience and dedication of the FAWCO, FAWCO Foundation and FAUSA boards and everyone who volunteers their time and expertise in support of our collective mission, including the support of each other and the improvement of lives of women and girls worldwide. Although I don't want to make this report any longer I would especially like to thank Immediate Past President and FAWCO Counselor Sallie Chaballier, who was an excellent sounding board and font of history and wisdom. Deep and heartfelt thanks go to Ann Marie Morrow, Kanika Holloway, Mary Dobrian, Shweta Gupta, Cathy Farnan and Patti Meek; their leadership and conscientious work has helped FAWCO thrive in the most difficult of times.

First Vice President's Report

The First Vice President's responsibilities include overseeing all FAWCO communications, publications, the FAWCO website, web services, FAWCO virtual meetings, public relations, digital and social media, advertising and sponsorship activities. 2022 was the year we were able to rebuild from the isolation of the previous years, gather energy and meet in person again. The Communications Team has been through some changes, but what stays the same is the ability of all the women who contribute to inspire with their skills, ingenuity, passion and compassion. I am so grateful to be able to work with these amazing colleagues.

Publications

A publications calendar in Google Workspace is used to schedule all of the various publications distributed by FAWCO. Mailchimp was used to distribute all publications in 2022. Overall subscription rates and open rates continue to rise or remain steady. Eight publications are in regular production. Work continues on streamlining publications and content. I'm grateful to everyone who works behind the scenes – the authors, proofers and editors. I especially appreciate the support of VP Global Issues Mary Dobrian and FAWCO Counselor Sallie Chaballier, who day in, day out are there for me and for FAWCO.

2022 Publication Distribution via Mailchimp: *Target Bulletin*, second Tuesday monthly, 10 issues; *News in Brief* (*NiB*), third Tuesday monthly, 11 issues; *Global Issues Digest* (*GID*), last Tuesday monthly, 10 issues; *UN Liaison*

Bulletin, 4 issues; US Liaison Bulletin, 4 issues; Club Presidents' Post, 3 issues; Connections – Letter from Headquarters, 4 issues; Inspiring Women (IW) magazine, 4 issues, plus Highlights issue; special mailings, 8 issues.

Inspiring Women Team Highlights for 2022

- 1. Produced four issues of the magazine with an average of over 2,700 opens per issue, a 35% increase in opens from 2021.
- 2. Produced and distributed a printed special Five Year Anniversary edition of the magazine with 2000 online opens, an 18% increase from 2021; this number doesn't include readers of the printed copies.
- 3. Hosted first-ever Live *Inspiring Women* Event on June 8 with 83 registrations. The online event lasted two hours, and ten speakers gave gardening advice and tips. Post-event feedback was extremely positive.
- 4. Increased engagement of *Inspiring Women* Facebook page with posting of regular videos and other promotions related to the magazine. Followers increased from 373 to 450, a 21% increase from 2021.
- 5. Increased direct subscriber numbers, currently 726, a 4% increase from 2021. This is the largest number of subscribers for all FAWCO publications.
- 6. Increased email open rates by 13% over the year (from 60 to 68%).
- 7. Direct ad revenue from IW \$ 5,400, which is 98% of ad revenue this year, 47% of all advertising and sponsorship revenue.
- 8. Continued to develop use of Google Analytics, assisted by Web Manager Cat Conner.
- 9. Recruitment of new team member, Kristin Haanaes (AWC Oslo), to take on the magazine layout.
- 10. Successfully handled a number of further *Inspiring Women* Team changes. These will be announced at the Biennial Conference in Bratislava.

The *Inspiring Women* Team has seven members: Liz MacNiven (AIWC Cologne), Editor-in-Chief; Elsie Bose (AWG Paris and FAUSA), Founder and Advertising Manager; Kristin Haanaes (AWC Oslo), Layout Coordinator; Karen Boeker (AWC Denmark), Distribution Manager; Berit Torkildsen (AWC Oslo), Social Media Manager; Michele Hendrikse Du Bois (Munich IWC and FAUSA), Features Coordinator and Haley Green (AWC London), Profiles Coordinator.

2022 revenue exceeded the budget plan by 34%, although there was a 30% decrease over the previous year's total advertising revenue.

Our longstanding advertisers continued to support us in 2022, but we gained only a few new sources. We added three advertisers: TASIS, Tharien's Art and The Existential Traveller. Two advertisers did not renew for 2022, AIOA and Reilly Financial Advisors.

Our two largest advertisers, London & Capital and The Short List, were very active participants in the FAWCO calendar. Both held webinars open to all FAWCO members. London & Capital also was a conference sponsor and participated in the Interim Meeting in Luxembourg.

Both sponsors offered to hold workshops for individual clubs or regions. London & Capital and AWC London had one event. Bill Short went to Europe in November and offered workshops for around eight individual clubs but nothing was scheduled, which was unfortunate. We did not build expectations with our vendors about results, but we did work with them to try and coordinate events with clubs. Some clubs responded but many did not. It is an issue in terms of renewals in 2023. Both will be up for renewal in the first quarter.

The advertising rate card was further streamlined. Advertising in Inspiring Women and presence of logo and links on the FAWCO website are the two main draws.

The themes for the 2023 Inspiring Women issues have already been decided and a list has been made of some prospective advertisers for each issue. Proposals will be sent out in the first quarter of 2023.

Google Workspace and FAWCO Documents

The Google Workspace platform gives FAWCO volunteers the ability to work effectively and collaboratively with the tools it offers such as Gmail, Meet, Drive, Docs, Forms among many others. Archiving, standardization and harmonization of documents continues on an ongoing basis. FAWCO's Operating Documents are tracked in a spreadsheet by FAWCO's Board and especially the Parliamentarian. The archiving of all FAWCO publications continues.

Website, Web Services, GDPR and Compliance

The Website Manager Catherine "Cat" Conner (AWC Hamburg) is responsible for the technical side of the website, but she also provides so much in terms of support and institutional knowledge. This year there was work on creating conference registrations for both the May 2022 conference in Luxembourg and also launching registration for Bratislava in December 2022. We very much appreciate Cat's professionalism, patience and expertise. Rheagan Coffey (AWC Dublin), Web Hosting Coordinator, and Cat ran a very useful workshop "Tech for Your Club" in Luxembourg and also made a recording that is available to Member Clubs. Continuous work on streamlining the website and processes continues. Liz Slaughter-Ek (AIC Malmö) continues her behind the scenes work with registrations for the website.

Remaining compliant with all privacy, copyright and GDPR policies on the website, behind the scenes and within all communications on the website and on social media platforms is imperative and a main focus. A workshop titled "GDPR and More — Club Policies Check-up" was held online in October moderated by FAWCO's President, 1st VP and Website Manager. It is recommended to have an annual review and support for Member Clubs in this area.

In 2022 the FAWCO website had 96,661 sessions (site visits) by 75,628 users. Sessions increased 14.88% and users increased by 16.54% from the previous year. This is due to increased traffic from articles published by the various Teams, including US Issues, Target and Global Issues, and from links to articles on social media platforms. SEO should be taken into consideration more in the future to continue to expand the reach of content provided by the Teams.

FAWCO Web Hosting services are offered as a benefit to all Member Clubs. Those who use this service benefit from a continuity of service and the ongoing connection with FAWCO's Web Services Team. Rheagan Coffey (AWC Dublin), Web Hosting Coordinator, is the backbone of this and her expertise, professionalism and support is truly valued. Wild Apricot's discount for FAWCO Clubs was renewed and updated again for 2022. The discount (23-28%) is offered by Wild Apricot to FAWCO Member Clubs. FAWCO Web Hosting services: 32 domain names registered with us (no change); 12 (1) websites hosted via FAWCO; 22 Clubs availing of the Wild Apricot discount; 5 Clubs with email hosting only (no change).

Virtual Meetings

FAWCO's virtual meetings program was launched in 2020; since then, Teams, Volunteers and Clubs have embraced the online meeting technology that enables us to connect and engage across the FAWCO world.

The Hopin Conference Platform as well as the streaming platform Streamyard continued to be used. The March 2022 Interim Meeting, Part 1 Virtual, *Focus on Future* used both these technologies. (150 registered) In addition, there was an online Environment Festival using the Hopin platform in May. (59 registered) The Inspiring Women Team held a virtual Garden Party in June that brought the magazine to life with talks and panels from members profiled the previous year. (83 registered) These free large-scale online events allowed members from around the globe to meet and engage on topics that inspired them.

Virtual meetings were regularly organized for FAWCO members including discussions and viewings of the documentaries *Jeyetna*, *In the Name of Your Daughter*, *The Long Shadow* and *The Ants and The Grasshopper*. Other virtual meetings included monthly Rep, RC, President and Philanthropy meetings, the Target Program

Health Farewell, Target Program Environment information sessions, CSW Orientations, the Health Team *Checklist with Robynne Pendariès* series, US Issues hosted *Tax Workshop* with Nathalie Goldstein of My Expat Taxes, a Health Team hosted *Menopause and You* presentation, FAWCO sponsors The Shortlist workshop, Global Issues Book Discussions, FAWCO Under 40 Hangouts and the Global Issues Youth Online Discussion Series. There were over 50 scheduled virtual meetings, events, workshops and online conferences held in 2022. Zoom was mostly used for these Virtual Meetings, with Google Meet also being increasingly utilized.

Continued use of connecting and engaging with Clubs and Members through virtual meetings is planned for 2023.

Public Relations and Media Team is now the Digital and Social Media Team

Ellie Badanes (AW Surrey, FAUSA) is the Chair of the Team and also continues in her role as Twitter Manager. We thank Ellie for her kind and caring leadership as she supports our core team, which includes the 1st VP. Our Team creates social media content across our platforms. We monitor our platforms and encourage engagement.

Over the course of 2022, Adelina Matinca (AIWC Cologne), Social Media Manager, moved more into a role of advisor for FAWCO's social media. The templates she created for FAWCO's public pages are lovely and help create a cohesive look and brand for FAWCO's public social media platforms. Later was used for links in the bio for Instagram and scheduling on Facebook and Instagram throughout 2022. At the end of the year, scheduling moved to being from Canva Pro directly or Meta Business Suite. Later is still used for links in bio for Instagram. The goal for 2023 is to see improved engagement across our platforms, more eyeballs, more likes, more comments and more followers. Social Media is an important tool for building our global community and creating content that is easily shareable by Member Clubs.

At the end of 2022 the main social media platforms of engagement were: FAWCO Private Member Facebook group, 1,246 members; FAWCO Public Facebook page @fawco, 1873 followers; FAWCO Inspiring Women Public Facebook page @FawcoIWMagazine, 450 followers; FAWCO Instagram @fawcoofficial, 827 followers; FAWCO Twitter @fawco, 596 followers; FAWCO Linkedin, 510 followers. All platforms saw growth in followers and overall engagement as a whole was steady or increased. Work continues on creating a professional, engaging and consistent message to connect all of FAWCO's audiences. As well as Adelina, the Team was supported by Counselor and advisor Sallie Chaballier (AAWE Paris) and FAUSA's 1st VP Communications, Brenda Brinkley. When we come together everyone's knowledge and encouragement is inspirational.

Second Vice President's Report

I am grateful for the opportunity to provide a summary of what our FAWCO Clubs have accomplished over the past year 2022. They have shone like diamonds, come out from their COVID-19 caves and continued to make an impact on their communities and supported their memberships. The following synopsis is an overview of our 57 FAWCO Clubs.

By springtime of 2022, most of our regions were slowly able to meet again in person. In May, we had the opportunity to come together as an organization and bring clubs together in Luxembourg and finally live out our intentions with the Luxembourg Interim Meeting of 2020.

As a kick-off to the Luxembourg Interim Meeting, I thought it would be a great idea to reactivate the team concept of the Member Clubs Team. Each appointed position of the Member Clubs Team has a purpose. As a collective group in action we are much more effective and efficient in getting information out, empowering and offering support to the member clubs. It worked well on joint calls and also presidents-only calls. In light of this, I have added to the FAWCO 101 presentation, an additional, alternative 4 pillars of Community, Support, Empowerment and Sisterhood. Now, to be mindful of rebranding sisterhood to mean inclusivity of everyone, we can just as easily say "friendship." We are still a community, which is the theme that overrides everything we do, supporting each other to reach our goals, reach big dreams and rise together.

The Member Clubs Team consists of:

- Regional Coordinators, Regions 1–10
- RC At-Large
- Club Presidents' Coordinator
- Cross Club Events Chair
- Club Workshops Coordinators
- Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging Chair
- Membership Coordinator
- U-40 (Mindset) Co-Chairs
- VP-Fundraising The FAWCO Foundation (a little bit of a crossover, but very helpful as most of our clubs have a philanthropy or fundraising chair; the concepts discussed are added value and keeping our reps, presidents and their boards in the know about The FAWCO Foundation activities, grants and awards).

Member Clubs Team and what we accomplished:

These are high level overviews as the current team leads or chairs have submitted their own reports in their own words, which can be found later in the Annual Report.

DEIB: Initiated a member club-wide exploratory survey to gauge how club Presidents and FAWCO reps were handling education and intentional DEIB topics of concern. It was a broad overview and provided insight into the struggles and success stories of clubs. It also provided a forum for additional questions and concerns. The team spearheaded bringing the use of and education about pronouns to the FAWCO board. Actionable items: adding the LGBTQIA2S+ flag to the website, providing support for clubs in how to talk to their members about DEIB issues. Access to a toolkit for member clubs.

Membership Chair: New Clubs – Magda Honffy, RC Region 4, and Rebecca DeFraites, our Membership Chair, were both instrumental in bringing in IWC Moldova as a new member club to the FAWCO family. Rebecca was also successful in adding a new person as an individual member who is working on creating a new club in the City of Oxford, UK. Meeting with SIWA South Korea board of directors about joining FAWCO.

Club Workshops: With 17 active workshops available to clubs, there is a lot that is accessible for clubs to seek additional support and add value to their FAWCO membership. Topics of interest are rebranding and FAWCO 101.

Cross Club Events Calendar: since COVID, still an informative forum to find online events open to all clubs. Added value to clubs who are in need of expanding what they offer their members.

U-40s: Goal Setting and Organization Happy Hours are popular topics that transcend all layers of our membership. These are informative calls that are pragmatic and help people set realistic goals with accountability. Their challenge is to eliminate the stigma of only being available to the Under 40 members. They are so much more!

TLC (Team Leadership Joint Reps Presidents and RCs) Calls – Topics covered included the following:

- Connections to your communities and to your members.
- What is your club's story? Your club's DNA and being true to who you are will help you to get members to join.
- Diversity as a community within and without
- Is your club reflective of your community?
- Getting to sustainable clubs with community support and connection. Looking to the future as sustainability.
- How can the Member Clubs Team empower you and your board?
- Rebranding and connecting to your local community.

Presidents, Let's Talk Calls – Topics covered included the following:

- Club Presidents' Coordinator: Soundchecks and Board Retreats (Team Brainstorming)
- Leading with a positive attitude Beginning with the end in mind. We focused on one main goal each month: what do you want to accomplish by the end of a term/year?
- What does membership need and want?
- Communicate well and often
- Productivity and engagement
- Efficiency and Teamwork
- Sharing vulnerabilities; connecting personally with the board and your community.
- How to get working women/moms with young kids to join clubs (reduced rates or topics of interest, evening meetings)
- Digitizing everything to attract new members
- Sustainable clubs and community service
- Branding Clubs workshops

Regional Coordinators Calls – Topics Covered:

- Meet and Greets/Regionals new ideas
- The Priority of RCs was getting back in personal touch and visiting clubs in their regions with very limited budgets. As COVID increased expenses and changed logistics and accessibility in many regions, travel would be necessary to keep in touch with clubs and help them to feel that they are part of the FAWCO family. Limited budgets and rising costs don't work. Also, given that the budgeted funds for RCs were not spent in over two years, not having the capability to use past funds awarded was a bit of a sore subject. It should be noted that an increased budget may be necessary in order to attract new Regional Coordinators to the position and keep the ones who have committed. It is also noted that a Regional Coordinator can submit an expense plan to the board of directors; however, that may not seem appealing or comfortable to do for the moment.
- Social media etiquette and cyberbullying were hot topics. Clubs need to be aware and include a policy in their bylaws and social media pages.

At Large – Rozanne Van Rie, former VP Member Clubs, has been an invaluable support in assisting the 2nd VP position as an interim RC for Region 1 when we had not identified a new RC for the region. She has also been instrumental in collecting Annual Reports, attending conferences and supporting my position administratively. As I am a full time self-employed person, I can trust Rozanne's communication style and help in keeping in touch with the RCs and in some instances, Presidents and Reps, and always attending the joint monthly calls. Region 9 – This RC is the Queen of the Whatsapp groups. Time zones are a real problem for meetings to be effective online. The WhatsApp group is the most effective form of communication. It has been suggested by Monica Jubayli, Regional Coordinator, that we take a closer look at the region and match up time zones properly. She uses an ongoing communication document to keep track of upcoming events and uses the WhatsApp group to keep reminders updated.

Region 1 – Welcomed a new RC after the Luxembourg conference. Cynthia Holden caught the FAWCO fervor and stepped up to rally the troops along with the FAWCO Rep of AWC Dublin, Nurdan Colleran. Melissa Mash was also instrumental in getting ideas flowing to plan a regional event for Region 1. This group launched a WhatsApp group in 2022 that proved to be a strong communication tool in bringing the Region together to foresee a Regional with everyone "all in" collectively for October 2023. All types of questions are posed in the group, and it is seen as a peripheral support.

Region 2 – Spearheaded by their fearless leader, Jonelle Lemcke, who hosted successful online Meet and Greets with the group. This region had some challenges, one of which is the impact of war on the Moscow club. Leadership positions were also difficult to fill.

Region 3 – Strong and mighty clubs of Region 3 looked at planning a regional; however, a host club was difficult to organize.

Regional in Region 4 – Magda Honffy, hosting a party at her residence for incoming and outgoing Presidents, Reps and VPs. 22 women attended from Region 4.

Mary Adams, FAWCO Rep of AWC The Hague, in turn carried the torch for an environmentally conscious Regional themed "Make a U Turn."

Region 5 – Women Who Grow Together Rise Together – AIWC Frankfurt Taunus Rhein/Main – Melissa McClain and Laureen Scharps, FAWCO Rep. I presented a newer version of the FAWCO 101 presentation to engage the attendees of the workshop. I also helped introduce and bring energy to the Bratislava Conference together with the Co-Conference Chair and AWA FAWCO Rep, Bev Bachmeyer.

Region 6 – The RC Ellen Delman, who is also the Head of Mission as a Consular Agent at the US Consulate Zurich, coordinated a meeting at the AWC Zürich clubhouse as a mini-regional. Our 3rd VP Mary Dobrian was able to attend the meeting to represent the FAWCO board.

Region 7 – The vast expanse of African clubs makes it difficult to meet in person for a regional; with COVID-19 travel logistics issues as well. It would be quite expensive to organize, as Presidents and Reps pay out of pocket. A virtual online conference would be a much more attractive option.

Challenges for clubs in 2022

- Leadership positions are difficult to fill coming out of COVID-19. Attracting leadership is difficult, and increasing membership for some clubs is also a challenge.
- Regions with a lot of distance between clubs need to have access to an online platform for regionals; but to do this we need a volunteer to handle the back end and setup on HopIn.
- Preventing silos in Regions
- Expansion of clubs to other cities and countries
- Social media presence, adding value for clubs and their sustainability
- Challenges with updating Member Club Profiles is an ongoing concern. Boards change mid-year, end of year, etc. Staying on top of communications and updates to these profiles is still a great challenge to overcome.

Member Club Highlights

- Plenty of milestone anniversaries happening 30, 60, 90 and 100 years (notable Centennial celebration I attended for AWG Paris).
- Charities while all of our charities big and small are important, it seemed even more special that clubs were able in times of COVID and lockdowns to manage to host fundraising events for their favorite charities.
- Increasing Membership some clubs were able to increase membership by 30% Notable mention: AIWC Genoa.
- Rebranding Hot topic!
- Tackling community presence and awareness of local impact.

- Community and the sense of community internally within clubs and externally, as they are impactful in their local communities. Closing one door and opening the environmental awareness door.
- Ratios changing within clubs from American-focused to internationally-focused.
- Highly successful Christmas lunches/bazaars and Founder's Day gatherings were in some instances the first events hosted in person.
- Expanding to include professional women and moms with kids.

Luxembourg Interim Meeting highlights:

- Outstanding FAWCO Representative Awards 2022 to Bessie Sioutas-Vassilopoulou (AWO Greece) and Elisabeth Shine (AWC Naples).
- The "speed dating" event was held with success for the first time, Reps and Presidents mixing and mingling with the opposite position in different clubs.

In closing out my term, my goal this term as 2nd VP Member Clubs was to focus on "Inclusiveness" and "community" in our outreach toward all of our clubs in all 10 regions of the world. Inclusive means to be intentional in our support as the Member Clubs Team to meet member club needs and elevate their growth goals. The member clubs team represents Diversity, Inclusion and Belonging, Club Presidents support, Cross Club events, our Under-40 mindset team, new clubs, fundraising support and our Regional Coordinators leadership. As the world evolves during these uncertain times, we can keep a positive and inspiring outlook and set an impactful example. To be pioneers for transformative change and awareness in support of the lives of women and girls' empowerment and safety is a noble purpose. I see us as leaders and not followers of empty trends of "international clubs" of today.

As the Member Clubs Team, we can imagine formative change among FAWCO clubs while encouraging friendship, diversity and inclusiveness and thereby leveling up our organization as a whole. We need to look toward the legacy that each of us are part of. The soul of our organization is the capability of the combined talents of everyone within it. Let's be courageous for each other, empower and cheer on our people to speak up, participate and stay fabulous and fierce while doing it.

Third Vice President's Report

The 3rd Vice President oversees FAWCO's four Global Issues Teams in the areas of Education, Environment, Health and Human Rights as well as the FAWCO Youth and Target Programs. She is responsible for the publication of the monthly *Global Issues Digest* and contributes to the monthly *News In Brief* publication.

Although still a presence, in 2022, the COVID-19 pandemic's dominance over our daily activities began to wane; however, another major international crisis cast a dark shadow over our lives, particularly in Europe: the Russian war of aggression in Ukraine. As war always does, it has had major consequences for women and girls in all of the Global Issues areas that FAWCO focuses on – Human Rights, the Environment, Health and Education – and this was reflected in the topics addressed by our Teams in activities and articles.

In 2022, FAWCO and FAWCO Member Clubs were able to begin meeting in person again, with a two-part Interim Meeting (virtual in March and onsite in Luxembourg in May) and several in-person Regionals and other events. Still, the virtual interaction that became the norm during the pandemic is probably here to stay, and we have all felt its advantages. Thanks to advances in virtual platforms, it's now easy for Teams or individuals to "meet up" online, sometimes at a moment's notice, and we continue to appreciate virtual events such as book discussions, speakers, themed festivals and workshops.

From January to May 2022, Ann Marie Morrow and I continued to lead the virtual Global Issues Youth Discussion series, which we began in September 2020. Here is Ann Marie's summary:

The second iteration of the Global Issues Youth Discussion Series ran online from September 2021 until May 2022. There were between 8 and 14 youths from FAWCO Clubs around the world participating monthly. Ann Marie Morrow, AWC Finland, and Mary Dobrian, AIWC Cologne, were the facilitators. This series was planned as a way to keep connecting and learning during lockdowns and coronavirus restrictions. As restrictions have ended in many countries where we live, there are no plans for a new course. In 2022, the series had the following themes: January "Resilience, Adaptation and Making the Most of Where You Are," My-Linh Kunst; February "Well-Being Tools You Can Use," Ann Marie Morrow; March "Responsible Tourism: Moving through the World as a Global Citizen," Mary Stange; April "Environmentalism and Hope," Valerie Garforth; May: Wrap up, trivia quiz. Feedback included: "Lots of fun! I loved connecting with like-minded youth all over the world and having engaging discussions about important and interesting topics." and "Talking to all these international people made me feel like I was traveling to other countries during the pandemic!"

Although the Youth Discussion Series ended for good in May, as we anticipated that young people would begin to be more active in the "outside world," another virtual event that began during the pandemic was continued throughout the year, with no current plans to end the series. The Global Issues Teams held three virtual book discussions in 2022:

- In March, the Environment Team hosted a discussion of Jane Goodall's *The Book of Hope*, led by Valerie Garforth. We discussed reasons for hope in the climate crisis and concrete actions we can all take.
- Next, the Health Team selected the book *In the Shadow of the Mountain* by Silvia Vasquez-Lavado; the discussion was originally scheduled for June, but postponed to November due to low signups.

- In honor of International Literacy Day, and with the Target Environment Cycle in mind, the Education Team hosted a discussion of *The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind* by William Kamkwamba on September 8. In addition to the subjects of libraries and access to education, salient themes were soil depletion and environmental disasters as well as renewable energy.
- In November we were fortunate to have author Silvia Vasquez-Lavado join us for the discussion of her book, *In the Shadow of the Mountain*, hosted by the Health Team. It was an inspiring talk about trauma, addiction and resilience.
- The Human Rights Team selected the historical novel *In the Time of the Butterflies* by Julia Alvarez as the book for discussion in February 2023.

The Global Issues Digest was published ten times in 2022, with a pause in July and August, when many members are traveling. As in the past few years, the December issue focused on highlights, drawing attention to some of each Team's most important articles of the year. All the Teams have great ideas for subject matter, and in addition to pure-information articles, they use the website and the Digest to introduce workshops and events. The Education Team, in particular, also regularly publishes reviews of recommended books.

<u>Teams</u>

Education:

The Education Team was the most prolific producer of articles on the FAWCO website, focusing strongly on SDG Targets and contributing numerous book reviews. In the fall, Co-Chairs Carol-Lyn McKelvey and Hollie Nielsen announced their intention to step down at the end of the 2022–23 term. Rebekka Klingshirn and Michelle Miller were confirmed as incoming chairs in early 2023, and will officially begin their term as of the March 2023 Conference. See the **Education Team report** for more.

Environment:

The Environment Team began the year with Amanda Drollinger as Chair, assisted by outgoing longtime chair Anne van Oorschot, while Alexandra Vo served as Target Chair for TP5 Environment (see Target below). However, a reshuffling took place mid-year, as Laurie Richardson stepped down from the UN Liaison position and Alexandra Vo took her place. Amanda Drollinger then moved into the Target Chair position, and Sheila Doucet and Jocelyn Fitzgerald took over as Environment Team Co-Chairs as of August 2022.

In collaboration with Target 5 Environment, the team held its second Environment Festival on the Hopin platform on May 7, with sessions on biodiversity, the circular economy and club Green Teams. In the fall, they also initiated a film series, which they plan to continue into 2023.

In November, three members of the Team – Ayuska Motha, Alexandra Vo and Sheila Doucet – represented FAWCO at COP27 in Sharm El Sheikh, Egypt. See the **Environment Team report** for more.

Health Team:

Health Team co-chairs Danielle Kuznetsov and Christine Riney stepped down from their positions as of the Interim Meeting in Luxembourg in March; however, they prepared material for the website and *Global Issues Digest* through the remainder of 2022. Deb Hadley and Rebekka Klingshirn took over as Health Team Co-Chairs as of August. See the **Health Team report** for more.

Maggie Palu continues to chair Clubs in Motion, collecting and sharing information about movement activities in member clubs. See **Clubs in Motion report** for more.

Human Rights:

The Human Rights Team, led by Karen Castellon and Mary Manning, produced several in-depth reference materials for the FAWCO website this year, including a slideshow of Human Rights resources, a toolkit for the 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence and a day-by-day calendar of actions for the 16 Days.

In articles on the website, the team highlighted the work of FAWCO Clubs and individual members providing help and support for refugees from the war in Ukraine.

The FAWCO Refugee Network, led by Ann Birot-Salsbury, Ulrike Näumann, Asma Darwish and Azadeh Kadkhodazadeh, went into retirement from regular activity but may be reactivated at any time.

Target Program:

The Target 4 Health cycle ended officially in March 2022, with the fantastic fundraising total of \$177,413.25. Rhobi Samwelly, head of Hope for Girls and Women Tanzania, was able to attend our in-person Interim Meeting in Luxembourg as a special guest. For more information, see the **Target 4 report** in the 2021 Annual Report.

Target 5 Environment officially launched at the Virtual Interim Meeting in March, with a live presentation at the in-person IM in Luxembourg in May. Alexandra Vo initially served as TP5 Chair; when she took over as UN Liaison in the summer, Amanda Drollinger moved into the role of Target Environment Chair. Tharien van Eck served as Selection Committee chair for TP5, leading a nine member team. (See **Target 5 report** for more.) Applications for Environment Target projects were accepted from March 23 to August 31; a total of seven projects were submitted. Six projects were promoted to Phase II of the application process, and a short list of three projects was selected in December, with clubs set to vote on the Target Project in early 2023. The selected project will be announced at the Biennial Conference in Bratislava.

Youth Program:

After a two-year hiatus during the COVID-19 pandemic, the FAWCO Youth Cultural Volunteers Program was relaunched with a week-long program hosted by AWC Amsterdam in June. AWC Zürich committed to hosting the Cultural Volunteers program in 2023. (See **FAWCO Youth Team report** for more.) After many years of dedicated service, Meg Brew stepped down as Co-Chair of FAWCO Youth following the Amsterdam CV program. My-Linh Kunst and Stacy Harris-Papaioannou will continue as FAWCO Youth Co-Chairs.

2022–2023 is my final year as VP for Global Issues. I am enormously grateful for the trust of the FAWCO Board and membership for allowing me to serve in this position for the past four years. I have loved doing this job and it has vastly broadened my horizons and increased my knowledge of global issues affecting women and girls. Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer's responsibilities include oversight and management of FAWCO's financial asset accounts, the maintenance of the financial records and preparation of the financial reports, coordination of an annual objective review of the financial statements and general oversight of the financial and internal controls of FAWCO.

Financial Assets

FAWCO's Financial Assets primarily consist of cash held in bank accounts as well as online accounts (PayPay, Quickbooks, Stripe and Wise) to facilitate online international transactions, specifically for Member Clubs to pay their annual membership dues and conference registration fees. At the end of 2022, SDFCU (State Department Federal Credit Union) approved FAWCO as a member organization. FAWCO closed the Washington Federal (WaFd) accounts in January 2023 and moved those funds into SDFCU for easier management of accounts. With the ever changing international banking regulations and security requirements, there is increasing awareness that FAWCO should consider a FAWCO Treasurer or Assistant Treasurer based in the USA.

Financial Records and Preparation of Financial Reports

FAWCO's financial records are maintained by the Treasurer using QuickBooksOnline, non-profit version. The 2022 preliminary Financial Statements have been prepared by the Treasurer and will be professionally reviewed by a CPA in spring 2023. Monthly financial reports and bank reconciliations were performed and presented to the Board. FAWCO's Finance Committee convened quarterly during 2022 to provide additional oversight of the Treasurer and FAWCO's finances. Open Finance Meetings were available to all FAWCO members to discuss the annual financial results as well as to review the 2023 budget.

2022 Preliminary Financial Statements

Based upon the 2022 Preliminary Financial Statements, FAWCO's financial position remains strong despite increasing pressures on club membership, inflation and fluctuations in exchange rates. Total 2022 income, primarily consisting of Advertising and Membership Dues, was in excess of the 2022 Budgeted Income by \$3.5k primarily due to the stellar results of FAWCO Advertising. The FAWCO Board maintained a tight rein on expenses, creating a savings of \$4.3k, primarily due to reduced travel and website management expenses. As budgeted, the 2022 IM Conference in Luxembourg lost \$8.7k. Donations to FAWCO during 2022 of \$9.6k were received. Overall 2022 Preliminary Financial Statements project an overall net increase in funds of \$6.9k.

As reported in the 2021 Annual Report, when submitting the 2022 Budget for approval by the Member Clubs, the overall 2021 preliminary net increase in funds was taken into account. Generally FAWCO prepares annual budgets to break even. However, due to the unusual circumstances resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, the Board determined that the 2021 net increase in funds should be used to subsidize the 2022 Conference, which will keep the IM Conference registration fees reasonable and encourage attendance by our Member Clubs.

Annual Review of FAWCO's Financial Statements

The Board and Finance Committee previously determined that it was in the best interest of FAWCO to have the financial records reviewed by a professional CPA once during the term of a Treasurer, and specifically in the year that the Treasurer is outgoing. This practice saves FAWCO over \$2k every other year while ensuring that the incoming Treasurer will begin their term with professionally reviewed financial statements. Accordingly, the FAWCO Financial Statements and supporting financial records for the year ended December 31, 2022 will be professionally reviewed in 2023 by a professional CPA and their report will be included in the 2023 Annual Report.

Financial and Internal Controls Recommendations

Oversight and management of the treasury operations includes periodic review of the financial and internal controls to ensure the safekeeping of FAWCO assets and to maintain the fiduciary responsibility of the Treasurer role and the Board. The following recommendations are suggested for 2022 and beyond:

Bookkeeper: The FAWCO Treasurer has access to bank accounts, maintains the Quickbooks financial records and processes all deposits and payments. A separation of duties between a treasurer and a bookkeeper should be considered. FAWCO would further benefit from an experienced bookkeeper able to provide consistent, accurate financial records over a longer period of time than a 2-year board position.

I would like to thank all the Clubs for their timely payment of Membership Dues, the Finance Committee for their guidance and a huge thank you to Alisa Cook-Roehs, current Finance Committee Chair, Patricia Aeby, FAWCO Assistant Treasurer, the Finance Committee, the FAWCO Foundation Board and the FAWCO Board for their patience and assistance during this past year and I look forward to working with them in the future.

I also ensured that Clubs who were not represented by a voting delegate at the Interim Meeting in Luxembourg were able to appoint a Club member who was attending to cast the Club's vote.

2022 Interim Meeting Report

FAWCO has hosted its Annual General Meeting in March, either as a Biennial Conference in odd numbered years where board elections, Resolutions and Recommendations and Bylaws Amendments are high on the agenda, or as an Interim Meeting, with a less hefty business agenda. The COVID-19 pandemic repeatedly interfered with our traditional plans and we were forced to cancel a series of meetings, including the 2020 Interim Meeting in Luxembourg in March that year; a postponement which we referred to as an "Open Regional" in November 2020; the 2021 Biennial Conference; and our 2022 Interim Meeting planned for March 4-6, 2022; all of which hoped to take advantage of the substantial deposit we had placed on the Luxembourg conference hotel in 2020.

Because of several key announcements which were timed to occur during the March meeting, we decided to split the 2022 Interim Meeting into two components. Part 1 was held online on the expected dates, March 4-6, and Part 2 of the Interim Meeting was rescheduled for May 19-21 in person at the Parc Alvisse Hotel, Luxembourg.

Part 1 Focus on the Future

Part 1 of our annual meeting was conducted as a Virtual Conference, March 4-6, 2022. During the weekend, 150 participants registered, representing 38 FAWCO clubs. FAWCO President, Emily van Eerten (AWC The Hague) welcomed attendees and reflected on the Russian invasion of Ukraine and efforts being undertaken by FAWCO clubs and members to help Ukrainians in need. With respect to the FAWCO Target Project, she noted that Rhobi Samwelly, Founder and Director of Hope for Girls and Women Tanzania, was selected as one of the inaugural Marianne Human Rights Defenders in January in a program initiated by the French government. She further commended FAWCO clubs and members for helping to raise the profile of Hope for Girls and Women Tanzania and combat the scourge of Female Genital Mutilation. In recognition of the death of FAWCO Counselor Kathleen Simon (AWC Bern, FAWCO President 2009-11) in January, FAWCO organized a special screening of JEYETNA, a documentary film about period poverty in Lebanon, made possible by Kathleen's support.

Foundation President Barbara Bühling (AIWC Düsseldorf) celebrated 50 years of Education Awards and 25 Years of Development Grants and presented a review of the past year and the 2021 Education Award and Development Grant recipients. FAUSA President Liz Janson (FAUSA) reported on FAUSA's 223 members and 11 active metro groups. FAUSA was able to host their annual meeting, the FAUSA Getaway, in person in October 2021.

Target Chair Tharien van Eck (AWC Antwerp) wrapped up FAWCO's fourth Target Program Health, announcing a grand fundraising total of \$176,000 for Hope for Girls and Women Tanzania. Target Environment Chair Alexandra Vo (FAUSA) officially launched the next (fifth) Target Program in support of the Environment with the

theme "Our Natural Environment: Empowering Women and Girls to Ensure a Sustainable Future," and highlighted the new two-phase application process. Liz MacNiven (AIWC Cologne), editor of FAWCO's Inspiring Women Magazine, presented a video in celebration of the Fifth Anniversary Edition of Inspiring Women Magazine and FAWCO Youth Co-Chair My-Linh Kunst (AWC Berlin) announced the Cultural Volunteers Program for the teenage children of our members would resume with a program in Amsterdam in June.

Sunday included a limited number of virtual sessions highlighting FAWCO at the UN, CSW66, the SDG #TurnitAround FilmFest, and the Global Issues Team led a book discussion on Jane Goodall's *The Book of Hope*.

Part 2 Celebrating FAWCO, Fun and Friendships

Part 2 of the Annual General Meeting took place, FINALLY, at the Parc Alvisse Hotel Luxembourg, May 19-21, 2022. Although COVID-19 still posed a risk, 96 participants attended, representing 25 FAWCO Member Clubs. Health protocols were more relaxed than during the height of the pandemic, but mask and social distancing protocols were observed where appropriate. For the first time, the Conference Agenda and Directory were available digitally, and attendees were encouraged to use a QR code to access it during the conference.

UN Liaison Laurie Richardson (AWA Vienna) reported on FAWCO's ongoing work at the United Nations. She highlighted the many ways that FAWCO's UN team members had worked in support of FAWCO's engagement at the UN, particularly in the areas of gender equality, human rights, climate change and migration. After eight years in the role, Laurie also expressed her gratitude toward her team and announced that she soon would be stepping down from her leadership role. She then made a motion for a Conference Resolution to reiterate FAWCO's commitment to UN SDG#5: Achieve Gender Equality and Empower All Women and Girls, and call for an end to all forms of discrimination against women and girls, including ensuring full access to universal sexual and reproductive health and rights, resolving to urge the US Senate to ratify the United Nations Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) and the US Congress to lift the time limit for the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA). After a discussion session on Friday, the finalized resolution was reintroduced and approved by the Delegates on May 21, 2022.

The FAWCO Foundation announced the recipients of the 2022 FAWCO Foundation Education Awards and Development Grants. Foundation Night "Celebrate FAWCO, Fun and Friendships" was a real celebration, with music, live and silent auctions and a chance to recharge after too much time in lockdown.

Ann Marie Morrow (AWC Finland), Vice President for Communications, thanked her teams and reported on their accomplishments, including website and publication statistics, with emphasis on the proliferation of virtual meetings — over 80 online events in 2021. Advertising and Sponsorship under Elsie Bose (AWG Paris/FAUSA) was double of the budgeted amount. She further expanded on the success of the Global Issues Youth Discussion Series, which she co-led with FAWCO Vice President Global Issues, Mary Dobrian (AIWC Cologne). Advertising and Sponsorship Chair Elsie Bose (FAUSA, AWG Paris) presented on the 5 year anniversary of the *Inspiring Women* magazine, launched in Mumbai in 2017. FAWCO has published 22 quarterly issues and profiled 339 women and 1 man, with 62 clubs and FAUSA represented. IW advertising accounts for 60% of FAWCO's total advertising and sponsorship revenue.

Treasurer Cathy Farnan (AWG Paris, FAUSA) reported that the 2021 Fund Balance Increased by \$14,200 as a result of a budget surplus for advertising/sponsorship and a decrease in travel expenses due to COVID-19. The 2022 Budget included an \$8,800 subsidy to cover expected shortfalls for the Luxembourg conference in light of ongoing COVID-19 disruption, helping to keep the registration fee as low as possible and encourage attendance.

FAWCO Vice President for Member Clubs, Kanika Holloway (AWC Antwerp), thanked her team and highlighted the ways in which FAWCO provided support to our member clubs, including regular "TLC" calls, RC Meet & Greets, celebration of club anniversaries and increased membership for some clubs, while dealing with "Zoom fatigue" and the dissolution of some clubs during the pandemic (AIWA Augsburg, AIWC Marrakech).

Sallie Chaballier (AAWE Paris) gave a beautiful tribute in memory of FAWCO Past President, Kathleen Simon.

Mary Dobrian (AIWC Cologne), FAWCO Vice President for Global issues, reported on the two new global initiatives, the Global Issues Book Discussion series and the Global Issues Youth discussions and celebrated the evolution of the *Global Issues Digest*, the monthly FAWCO publication with articles from the Global Issues Teams on our core issues. Team Chairs Hollie Nielsen (AWC Central Scotland) and Carol-Lyn McKelvey (FAUSA, AIWC Cologne) [Education]; Alexandra Vo (FAUSA) reporting for Anne van Oorschot (AWC The Hague) and Amanda Drollinger (AWC Central Scotland)[Environment]; Christine Riney (AWC Hamburg) and Danielle Kuznetsov (AWO Moscow) [Health]; Mary Manning (Heidelberg IWC) on behalf of Chair Karen Castellon (AWC Berlin, FAUSA) [Human Rights]; Maggie Palu (AWA Aquitaine) [Clubs in Motion]; Ulrike Näumann (Heidelberg

IWC) and Ann Birot-Salsbury (AAWE Paris), along with Asma Darwish (AAWE Paris) [FAWCO Refugee Network]; My-Linh Kunst (AWC Berlin) [FAWCO Youth] and Alexandra Vo (FAUSA) [Target Program 5 Environment] reported on the highlights for the year.

The Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging Team, led by chair Meredith Mani (AWC Amsterdam) hosted a Panel Discussion with Pamela Combastet (AAWE Paris), Sara Bittner (AWC Amsterdam) and Rick Chizmadia (FAUSA, AWC Zürich) that explored diversity initiatives which could be implemented by FAWCO Member Clubs.

Sallie Chaballier (AAWE Paris) and My-Linh Kunst (AWC Berlin) received FAWCO's highest honor, the Circle of Honor, for their outstanding and ongoing service to the organization. The Caroline Curtis Brown Spirit Award was presented to Rick Chizmadia in recognition of his trailblazing service to and for FAWCO, and Tharien van Eck (AWC Antwerp) for her meticulous and successful work leading the Target Health Program, especially during pandemic. FAWCO Rep Appreciation Awards were given to Bessie Sioutas-Vassilopoulou (AWO Greece) and Elizabeth Shine (AWC Naples) for their work to promote FAWCO and support our mission.

UN Liaison Report

A Year of Changes

2022 was the 25th anniversary of FAWCO's ECOSOC accreditation at the UN. It was also a year of changes. This report was written in partnership with Laurie Richardson, UN Liaison from 2015-2022:

At the 2022 Interim Meeting in Luxembourg, I stepped down as FAWCO's UN Liaison after eight years. In 2015, then FAWCO President My-Linh Kunst appointed me UN Liaison. I began this journey standing on the shoulders of my wonderful predecessors: Paula Daeppen, Pam Perraud, and Sara Von Moos. I am eternally grateful to Alexandra Vo for taking on the position, and to the UN Advocacy Team for their energy and commitment to this important work. FAWCO's UN Advocacy program and UN Reps Team are in very good hands with Alex. I am very proud of the work we have done together to raise our visibility in the UN NGO community. – Laurie Richardson

FAWCO appointed two new UN Reps in 2022: Asma Darwish (AAWE Paris) and Sallie Chaballier (AAWE Paris). Asma will follow the UN Human Rights Council and Sallie will work with the NGO CSW Geneva.

CSW66, New York

At the 66th UN Commission on the Status of Women (CSW66) in March 2022, the nexus between gender equality and climate change was the priority theme – very timely for FAWCO as we launched the new Target Program on environment. Over 50 FAWCO members participated virtually in CSW and the NGO CSW Forum. The UN Advocacy team presented virtual orientation sessions on how to get the most out of the CSW experience, as well as on the impacts of climate change on women and girls. FAWCO's delegation participated in hundreds of virtual events over two intense weeks, and kept in touch on an active WhatsApp group. UN Rep Alexandra Vo (FAUSA), now UN Liaison, was able to attend events inside the UN headquarters in New York for the first time since March 2020. You can read our <u>CSW Blogs</u> to learn more.

FAWCO UN Reps helped plan the NGO CSW66 Forum as members of the Global Planning Committee, working with leaders from NGO CSWs in New York, Geneva, Vienna, Africa, Asia/Pacific, Latin America/Caribbean, and Middle East/North Africa. Our UN Reps in Geneva and Vienna co-organized an NGO CSW Consultation Day and NGO Forum parallel events. "The Human Right to a Clean, Healthy and Sustainable Environment: Building Global Solidarity and Partnership;" "Food on All Tables: Promoting access to food for all and its impact on women's health and rights;" and "Climate Justice for Women and Girls: Approaches to Combating Ecocide." FAWCO also signed on to several <u>CSW66 NGO advocacy statements</u>, including a statement on the crisis in Ukraine.



COP27, Sharm el-Sheikh, Egypt

The 27th UN Climate Change Conference took place on November 6-18, 2022 with over 35,000 participants from 197 countries. There are always more civil society representatives who want to attend than there are badges. FAWCO was awarded 3 badges per week which were used by Ayuska Motha (AIWC Cologne), Alexandra Vo (FAUSA), and guest, Marisa Hutchinson, of <u>IWRAW-Asia Pacific</u> during the first week. During the second week, FAWCO's delegates were Ayuska Motha (AIWC Cologne), Sheila Doucet (Environment Team Co-Chair, AAWE Paris) and student guest, Alice Finno of John Cabot University. As we have done in previous years, we amplified our voice through participation with the <u>Women and Gender Constituency</u> of which we are a voting member: "Over the past several years of the international climate change negotiations it has been established and agreed by governments across the world, who are Parties to the <u>UNFCCC</u>, that gender equality and ensuring women's human rights are necessary to effectively act on climate change mitigation and adaptation."



Education about the work of the UN

1. Environment Festival, May 6-8, 2022

On May 7 of the festival, the UN Advocacy Team had a virtual panel called "Join the Climate Justice Movement: CSW66, COP26, Local Action." Laurie Richardson was the moderator where Amanda Drollinger recounted her general experience at COP26 in Glasgow; Alexandra Vo reviewed CSW66's priority theme on the environment; and Ayuska Motha spoke of the gender just climate solution through the Women and Gender Constituency.

2. FAWCO for CEDAW, October 27, 2022

CEDAW is the 1979 UN Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women. In response to the death of Iranian Mahsa Amini, the exclusion of Afghan women in university and the rollback of *Roe v Wade* in by the US Supreme Court, FAWCO held a virtual panel on CEDAW - what it is and how it can be used locally. Jessica Buchleitner was the moderator, with Pam Perraud and expert guests, Elahe Amani and Gail James.



3. SDG Awareness:

The Sustainable Development Goals are almost halfway to their 2030 deadline. Awareness of the SDGs is one of the goals of the UN Team. FAWCO's #TurnItAround SDG Film Festival was in the virtual Interim Meeting in March. It received 11 submissions of short videos by FAWCO members that were heartwarming and educational. These included "Living the SDGs" by AWA Vienna, "A Charming Story" by The FAWCO Foundation, "Heart Pillows" and "Meaningful Masks" by HIWC.



For the May Interim Meeting in Luxembourg, the team made SDG paddles so attendees could pick their favorite SDGs, snap a selfie and post it on social media with the tag #FAWCO. The paddles were later used at the regional conference in November in Vienna.

Global Issues

Education Team Report

Despite the post COVID-19 challenges of 2022, the Education Team celebrated several successes.

First, we revised our Mission Statement, which is based on SDG4.

MISSION STATEMENT: The FAWCO Education Team's mission is to inform about and advocate for the **UN Sustainable Development Goal 4**, particularly as it relates to women and girls.



Areas of Emphasis

- 1. Universal Literacy and Numeracy (SDG Target 4.6)
- 2. Equal Access to All Levels of Education, Pre-primary to Secondary (SDG Targets 4.1, 4.2, 4.5)
- 3. Access to and Initiatives in Continuing Education after Secondary School (SDG Targets 4.3, 4.4)

4. **Global Citizenship** in that all learners acquire the knowledge and skills needed to promote sustainable development (SDG Target **4.7**)

We contributed to the *Global Issues Digest* (GID) and the *News in Brief* (NiB) on a monthly basis. In addition, we held one virtual event.

Our committed and diverse team grew by four new members: Jonelle Lemcke (AWC Denmark), Lindsey Krummell (AWC Central Scotland), Rainier Sielaff (AWC Finland) and Sara Bittner (AWC Amsterdam) to total sixteen. Co-chairs were Hollie Nielsen and Carol-Lyn McKelvey. Hollie is resigning, effective March 26, 2023, and Carol-Lyn resigned effective December 31, 2022. This year, we've held monthly Team chats, allowing us to get to know each other better as well as share suggestions and knowledge. We have tried to liaise with other Teams and FAWCO groups. We have two members who are on other Teams or publications and these have been our best collaborations; Mary Adams (AWC The Hague) is also on the Human Rights Team and Karen Boeker (AWC Denmark) contributes to Inspiring Women. We hope to encourage liaisons in 2023 in order to promote communication among the various groups as well as to support each other's goals.

The highlight of 2022 was our virtual event. In connection with the Global Issues Book Series, the Education Team chose *The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind*, by William Kamkwamba, as the summer read. On World Literacy Day, September 8, Carol-Lyn presented a well attended virtual discussion and Q&A session with FAWCO members; we also broke out into small groups for discussion. If interested in viewing the discussion, please contact the Education Team Co-Chairs.

We divide our GID and NiB entries into our four focus areas. In some of our GIDs we include Notes from the Field; these are personal reflections of people working in the relevant focus areas. For example, see Nancy Lynner's (AWC Central Scotland) March contribution: *How to Be a Global Citizen* about her book *What Is a Perfect World?* This year we continued with the Education Roundup, which is designed to keep members updated on worldwide developments in Education. For example, see the <u>February Round Up</u>. In addition, in most GIDs, we include a review of a book from the relevant focus area. See Nancy's <u>December *Book Review*</u> of *Hands Around the Library: Protecting Egypt's Treasured Books*. We are developing a Recommended Books section on our landing page.

January and February concentrate on Bridging the Gap between secondary school and technical, vocational and tertiary studies. In January, Carol-McKelvey (FAUSA & AIWC Cologne) wrote <u>SDG4 & African American Girls'</u> <u>Educational Experiences in the US: An Intersection</u>. In February, Lindsay Nygren (AWCC Scotland) wrote <u>Bridging</u> <u>the Gap - Overcoming Academic Disruptions on the Road to Higher Education</u>.

In March and April, we focused on Global Citizenship, and Carol-Lyn wrote the March article, <u>Spotlight on</u> <u>Afghanistan: Update on School Accessibility for Girls</u>. Also, in April, in connection with the Luxembourg meeting, the Education Team celebrated reading with photos of our favorite reading spaces, which we displayed at the conference.

May and September cover Literacy, with June-August devoted to the summer read. In May, Nancy Lynner contributed a <u>video</u> entitled *Focus on Literacy (SDG Target 4.6): The Power of Phonics and Letters*. Also in May, Anne van Oorschot (AWC The Hague and Co Chair of the Environment Team) wrote about <u>Literacy and The AWC The Hague Library</u>. This article is an example of how the Education Team tried to collaborate with other GI Teams. And in September, Hollie Nielsen (AWCC Scotland) contributed an article on <u>Literacy in Malawi</u>.

October and November are devoted to the topic of Equal Access. Our October GID contribution was from Carol-Lyn: <u>Libraries, Libraries and More Libraries</u>. Also in October, Mary Adams, in connection with the Global 16 Days Campaign against Gender-Based Violence, wrote <u>Gender-Based Violence: A Push Factor for Human</u> <u>Trafficking</u>. In November, Carol-Lyn continued our focus on libraries with her <u>And More Libraries!</u> Finally, in November we had our traditional article on educational charitable gifts with our <u>2022 Charitable Giving and</u> <u>Gifts for the Holidays with an Education Twist</u>. Several 2022 articles were highlighted in the December GID

Environment Team Report



Our majestic world is changing, rapidly. The Environment Team continues its mandate to elevate awareness concerning a wide variety of environmental issues and to encourage each one of us to reflect upon how we are both impacted by and being active players in the environment in which we all live. Against a backdrop of a dizzying array of disasters which rocked the world this year—devastating floods in Pakistan, severe drought across southeastern Africa, multiple hurricanes in the Caribbean, fires sweeping across the Amazon, California and Australia—we find hope in understanding the interconnected

causes for this imbalance - and by highlighting concrete solutions.

In a spirit of solidarity, as many of us were still uncertain about in-person meetings, we organized an online Environment Festival for the second year in a row, on the Hopin platform which took place on Saturday, May 7, 2022. The overarching themes were Biodiversity; Working Towards a Circular Economy and Climate Action: tips on creating a Green Team at your Club. The afternoon talks featured presentations and lively discussions by FAWCO members, as well as Amit Godse from Bee Basket in India and Stefano Funari from "I Was a Sari" (a company which upcycles clothes, accessories and jewelry from previously loved saris). We appreciated the ingenuity, innovation and enthusiasm each speaker shared with us that afternoon.

The reception for the online festival was positive. However, as members venture back into the real world of live interactions, we will evaluate the need for a festival as circumstances evolve. Many thanks to Amanda Drollinger who worked tirelessly as the Festival Chair.

That said, the Environment Team continues to innovate! On Friday, October 21, we held our first movie night, a documentary entitled, "The Ants & The Grasshopper: How do you change someone's mind about the most important thing in the world?". It is the story of a dynamo from Malawi, Anita Chitaya, who is a farmer and community activist who took the reality of climate change happening in her village to American farmers in their backyards. The response was positive and the concept of an environment themed movie night was thought to be enthusiastically received.

Health Team Report

In 2022 the Health Team produced a variety of content from articles in the *Global Issues Digest* to seminars to book discussions. All of the Health Team articles can be accessed <u>here</u>.

One of the highlights of 2022 was the "SHE (Sustainable Healthy Environments) Maps." This involved creating a word for reflection for each month of the year. Each month provided food for thought often accompanied by media or a worksheet. A summary of the words for the year can be found <u>here</u>.



The Team decided to focus on the Phases of Women's Health for 2022. This was illustrated using five women in various stages of life. The five stages were Blossom, Arise, Balance, Expand and Wisdom. These five stages spanned from birth through puberty right up to menopause and beyond.

In keeping with this theme, in October we hosted a popular seminar on Menopause facilitated by Nurse, Midwife and Menopause Coach Jessika Luther (AWC Finland). There was an exceptional turnout and significant positive feedback. This is clearly an issue that resonates with FAWCO members.

The Team also featured some of the United Nations designated days, weeks or months for various health issues on social media. These were often accompanied by related articles for the *Global Issues Digest* such as the feature on HIV/AIDS in the November GID by Tharien Van Eck (AWC Antwerp).

In November we had the pleasure of hosting a book discussion with author Silvia Vasquez-Lavaro about her book *In the Shadow of the Mountain*. It was an illuminating and interesting discussion for all involved.

In the Autumn, we saw the departure of Health Team Co-Chairs Danielle Kuznetzov (IWC Heidelberg) and Christine Riney (AWC Hamburg) after a wonderful term of inspiration and creativity throughout the pandemic and beyond. Deb Hadley (AIWC Düsseldorf) and Rebekka Klingshirm (IWC Heidelberg) have the daunting task of filling their shoes going forward.

2023 goals include growing the team and encouraging FAWCO members to get involved and share their stories and expertise. We aim to continue to promote health, highlight current issues and health inequalities and inspire members to prioritize their health and provide information and resources that will help them do so.

Clubs in Motion



Clubs are starting to resume almost normal activities that can be reported to Clubs in Motion, but we are still taking into account individual activity as well as that of groups, and there are plenty of activities other than just walking or hiking that help to keep members healthy, both physically and psychologically. Any new suggestions about activities are always welcome.

AWC Amsterdam-Haarlem has a walking group of 28 members, though not all participate every week. They walk the dunes, which cover 15,000 acres and are

inhabited by wildlife (all protected), watching how nature and the animals change with the seasons. They have been walking the dunes for ten years, and during Covid they decided to walk twice a week, walking about 1-1/2 hours and covering 5 to 7 km, not just in the dunes. They added parks in the city and along the coast. Although Covid restrictions have lessened, they continue to walk twice a week. Weather is sometimes a problem, but they have learned to live with it and accept the challenge, even on cold and misty days. Another challenge is that they sometimes take time to meditate, which means not talking for 10 to 15 minutes while they walk and listen to the forest. They have done forest bathing, tree hugging and sitting at their base to feel their energy. Trees give off essential oils that are beneficial to our immune system, which is another reason the Haarlem walkers feel so healthy thanks to their weekly walks.

AWC Antwerp members and friends organized two walkathons in 2022 to raise money for Caring Hearts, a group of women who make Heart Pillows for breast cancer patients in the greater Antwerp area. Not only was it great to be out walking in nature, but it was also a good fundraising opportunity for the club.

AW Aquitaine is spread out over an entire region and doesn't have regular group activities but sometimes members visit each other, and take walking tours of their local places of interest. In June, two members wandered in some historical villages, one of which is a circular bastide, so it's not certain whether all the walking was intentional that day. The club's attempt to organize a walk along a 20 km segment of the Camino de Santiago in the Lot-et-Garonne was once again de-railed but they have not given up hope.

AWC Bern has a hiking group that walks weekly from the middle of May until the middle of October. There are usually about 5 participants. They reported that it wasn't the best of hiking seasons, for a variety of reasons, but they still managed to get out and about, which is confirmed by some magnificent photos.

AWC Bogotá organized eight hikes in 2022, both in the city and in the surrounding countryside, with an average of about 8 km each. Highlights included seeing ancient pictograms and sweating their way up and down mountains. They also had a cabalgata, riding trails on horseback, otherwise known as a cavalcade.

AWC Brussels doesn't keep a tally of how much members have walked, run, or cycled, but they are looking into the possibility of keeping track, so to speak, via a website or app. Member Lorraine runs every morning in summer along the coast at her second home in France, and ran a total of 326 miles in July and August.

Three **AIWC Casablanca** members participated in the annual Shine Walk in September in London, England, to raise money for cancer research. This time they did the half-marathon. Two of them did the full marathon in 2016, all three did the half-marathon in 2018, and two did the half marathon in 2019.

AWC Central Scotland organized an environmentally focused event in 2022, a litter pick-up on Portobello beach, to get members thinking about Target Project 5.

AIWC Cologne organized a climate march as well as two clean-up days, which involved walking and even bending. Member Mary walked the Caminho Português pilgrimage from Porto to Santiago de Compostela in early October - 250 km in 14 days - carrying all her luggage on her back. She said it was rural and beautiful, and good for both body and soul.

AWC Denmark has a very small walking group, sometimes only two people, but they walk every month. In February, 10 members took to the streets as ladies of the night to view the Copenhagen Light Festival, and walked 8 km. In November, four members walked 6.5 km through the Bernstorff Park and finished at Queen Louise's Tea House, and two members walked 6 km at the Deer Park to watch the historic Hubertus Hunt.

AWC Dublin has several very enthusiastic MOTION groups - Hillwalking, Herbert Park Steppers, Sea Swimming, and Dublin Walking Tours, as well as a new activity, golf lessons. The Hillwalking bi-weekly walks are usually on the nearby Dublin/Wicklow Mountain, but participants appreciate variation, such as the Bluebell Walk in May, when they saw not just bluebells, but also plenty of beautiful wild garlic. Four members also participated in the annual ARC Cancer Support Torch of Hope relay in October.

AIWC Düsseldorf notes that physical exercise is healthy for bodies, but it can also feed the souls. One of the benefits of living in the beautiful Rhein valley is the opportunity for members to do both simultaneously thanks to their walking and hiking groups. The Grafenberg Forest Hikes group has been active for several years. No matter what the weather conditions are, members meet up every other week for the 60 to 90 minutes brisk walks, sometimes accompanied by their dogs. In July 2022, some of them did a 17 km forest hike. After the walks, they sometimes refresh themselves with seasonal fruits or vegetables from a nearby stand, and in autumn, the stand also sells Federweißer "new" wine. The club also has a recently launched dog-walking group; members and their canine companions meet up at pre-determined locations once a month for a 45-minute walk. The walking/hiking groups helped get many of the members through the challenges and stress of the Covid years, and the club is looking forward to launching more physical activity-based groups in the near future as everyone tries to become more active.

AlWC Frankfurt-Taunus-Rhein Main hosted a Wellness Week in February that started as a result of the lockdown, as a way to give members value for their club membership when they could not meet in person. During the course of the week, they offered walks as well as Pilates, Bootcamp, and nutrition and well-being sessions, mostly on Zoom. At about the same time, one of their members came up with the idea of a hiking group, the Sole Sisters, a group of about 15 members who take turns organizing a monthly walk, with about 8 to 10 participants each time. The walks are not arduous, but most are a 2 to 3 hours hike with lunch or coffee afterwards. The club also has a Biking Babe group which also developed as a result of the pandemic and gave members an opportunity to meet outdoors. There are about 10 members who meet once a month to cycle around the area. Many of them have electric bikes, but from time to time a ride is scheduled that will work even for "occasional" cyclists. Rides are typically 2 hours, with lunch during or afterwards. There was also an all-day ride from Frankfurt to Aschafenburg. In addition to hikers and cyclists, the club has a tennis league that has been in existence for over 40 years, and the founder is still a member. The league, which plays weekly, is for experienced players at all levels, and has four groups, with a total of 48 players. An off-shoot is a Beginners

Tennis group which takes lessons in hope of joining league play. Tennis is one of the club's most popular groups, and some women join the club simply for the tennis benefit.

AIWC Genoa reported that 13 members walked a total of 5.2km in two and a half hours in December for a Food Tour of the remaining original food shops in the old town, many of which are hidden away in narrow winding streets.

AWC The Hague has an active Walkie Talkie group that meets weekly for walks in the city, in the woods, and on the beach. There's lots of laughter and chatter during the walks, and then participants head to a local café for more nattering.

AWC Hamburg members participated again in 2022 with a big turnout for the Laufend Gegen Gewalt charity run that is sponsored by the Hamburg Autonomous Women's Shelters for women and their children escaping violence at home. The event, which was held at the end of August, returned to its pre-pandemic format with a run around the Alster Lake. More than 30 runners, including 19 members, represented AWCH at the run, helping to raise money and increase awareness of Hamburg's domestic violence shelters. Whether running, walking, or cycling, members covered 87 miles, and are looking forward to participating again in 2023. Inspired by their 2021 Summer Challenge, 45 AWCH members, along with family and friends, embarked on a second challenge in 2022, from May 1 to June 30. In a virtual "sea to shining sea" competition across the USA, 63 participants, divided into three teams, toured 18 national parks, monuments, and seashores. The total distance of 6,176.8 miles was conquered by running, walking, rowing, cycling, swimming, high-intensity interval training, and just counting steps. By far the most popular sport was cycling, making up about 30% of the traveled miles. The final leg of the journey took them to the L.A. International Airport, where they boarded a plane to Hawaii, just in time to celebrate the 4th of July. The forty-five AWCH members clocked a total of 11,264 miles.

Heidelberg IWC has a Let's Walk group that meets once a month. A member leads the others on her local or favorite walk. There are seldom more than 7 members, but there are always several dogs. The club also participated once again in the annual NCT Lauf, a virtual charity event at the beginning of July. The HIWC team of 14 members, all free to choose their individual routes and distances, whether an ambitious run or a leisurely stroll, raised money in support of the work at the National Center for Tumor Diseases in Heidelberg. The team walked and ran more than 400 km in 3 days and came in 32 nd out of 240 teams. Member Tiffany came in 4th out of 1408 women, with a total of 85.98 km. The club also participated in Heidelberg's Stadtradeln challenge, also in July, by recording all the kms they cycled as a team, involving as many daily journeys as possible in an environmentally friendly way. They cycled 320 km for Heidelberg over 21 days in July, helping to reduce the amount of CO2 going into the environment, since the competition encourages people to leave their cars at home and cycle.

AWG Languedoc-Roussillon continues to invite members of other local anglophone groups to join their monthly walks, usually about 6 km, exploring their beautiful region. Sometimes members bring along their dogs. The club also has a Beach Babes group, which changes its name to Winter Beach Walkers for their weekly activity during the colder season. They also walk about 6 km, and after their walks, they stop at a café for a hot drink, or sometimes even for lunch. When they walk in the water, they get extra exercise putting their shoes back on. Club members also participated in the annual Walk for Life and raised 215 euros to donate to Cancer Support France Languedoc.

AWC London has a very active and enthusiastic hiking group. Each month they travel via train to the beautiful countryside around London for hikes that range from 7 to 12 miles and always include a stop at a cozy English pub. They have anywhere from 10 to 20 participants and hike in all weather and mud! In 2022 they covered over 120 miles (not counting the train rides).

AC Lyon has a fitness group with a "pretty regular gang plus occasionals" who go to a gym with an Englishspeaking trainer twice a month. From their photos, one would guess that they have a lot of fun while remaining fit.

AWC Madrid decided to focus on promoting health via exercise, and especially through walking, and programmed monthly walks through Madrid parks and elsewhere for exercise and to get to know their surroundings. They had gorgeous weather and a great turnout to see the almond trees blooming, and a comfortable mountain walk, followed by a Summer Challenge to do at least 15 minutes of exercise per day when the club was closed and members were on vacation. They had a cultural and historic tour led by a member, and the annual 5 km Walk Against Cancer. Members enjoyed the themed walks and the occasional trip

outside the city for longer walks. On July 3, member Joan completed Challenge Roth, a long-distance triathlon of 2.4 miles swimming, followed by 112 miles cycling, and ending with a 26.2 mile run. It was a special decade birthday celebration for her, and took her just over 14-1/2 hours to complete. She commented that it wasn't her first race at that distance, but it had been a while...

Munich IWC continues to astonish with its variety and quantity of motion, with a fantastic total of 43,537 kms in 2022, including individual and short small-group walks, running, cycling, swimming, sailing, skiing, golf, Zumba, peloton, Qigong, yoga and Kundalini yoga, Pilates, gym, aquafit, weekly Tai Chi exercise classes, and belly dancing! Sailing is MOTION too. Although a sailor clocks nautical miles, the body is in constant motion, providing a workout for the muscles. The sailor also reported swimming, but there were no details. The club also organized choreography and dance rehearsals for their Auction of Talents, which had been postponed for almost 2-1/2 years because of Covid. In October, they had their first long group walk in quite some time. In April, several members multi-moved, and one walked and ran, as well as cycling 720 km from Prague, Czechia, to Penzberg, Germany. Two more members have also added their kms along the Camino de Santiago. Member Astrid completed the Camino in 2021.

AIWC Naples has a very active walking group. Board member Meredith is an artist and passionate walker and stairs-lover who often goes on paid Italian group walking tours, and then proposes the same tour to the club and friends, as a fund-raiser, with each participant paying 5€, and the total is donated to the club. The walks and stair-climbs have become so popular that they sometimes have to be repeated. The group does historical tours, vineyard and winery tours, and even managed a walk with a mozzarella-making lunch.

The North American Connection has an informal walking group whose walks are more spontaneous than planned. The group uses WhatsApp to spontaneously suggest walks, which could coincide with something of interest, such as the blooming bluebells, or a returning NAC member's visit, or simply, "It's a gorgeous day. Who's up for a walk?" The number of participants varies, but it is usually a cozy, chatty group for a wander in the West Midlands of England. In summer they took a 6-mile walk to a neighboring village for a pub lunch.

AWG Paris – Tuileries Walkers 'n' Joggers can start their week with a gentle workout while chatting with friends in the beautiful Tuileries garden, followed by a walk, jog, or run around the gardens, each at her own pace. No matter how fast or slow, there's always another member alongside. After about an hour, the group heads for a rejuvenating tea or coffee at one of the *buvettes* in the park or a nearby café. The club also has a monthly hiking group which explores the countryside at different locations within the Île de France. There is a guide, and no charge for the hikes, but participants may make a small cash donation to one of the refugee projects with which the guide is involved. AWG members also took a day trip by train to Strasbourg to walk around the city's Christmas markets and soak in the magical atmosphere, and the club's Paris museum visits also entail walking.

AAWE Paris members continue to participate in the annual Rochambelle weekend in Normandy. On the weekend of June 2, a dozen women gathered for the 5th year in a row to participate in the 5 km walk/run in support of cancer research and victims of breast cancer. Rhobi Samwelly, the Founder and Director of Hope for Women and Girls Tanzania, which was the focus of FAWCO Target Project 4, was their guest of honor. The Rochambelle group raised 130€ to support breast cancer survivors and 130€ for Target Project 5.

AWSurrey has a group that hikes every Friday for ten months of the year, except during school holidays, but they don't keep track of the distances covered. There are usually 8 to 10 hikers per week who walk approximately 3 miles.

AWA Vienna was truly in MOTION in 2022, with 3 walking/running groups that are active every week. The Walking Around the Ring group meets every Tuesday to walk approximately 5 km, with an attendance of 5 to 10 members each time, and the group only defaulted once in the entire year. The UN/AWA group has about 8 to 10 people who walk every week on Tuesdays at the Alte Donau and on Thursdays at the Stadion in Prater, usually about 5 km for each walk. The club also has a Sunday Fast Walking group with about 6 members who rapidly walk 6 to 10 km on Sunday mornings. AND the club has 3 yoga groups that practice weekly.

AWC Zürich has a walking group with 25 active members, making it the Club's largest activity group. On most Thursday morning city walks, there are about 12 to 15 participants who are not deterred by rain, snow, or heat. There is also a hiking group with about 11 active members who did 6 hikes in the mountains. In 2022, the two groups walked 2900 km. Two members also hiked the Mont Blanc trail together. The Mont Blanc tour was 10 days and 170 km long, 10,000 meters up and down, through 3 countries. Individual MargaretH is still walking a minimum of 12,000 steps a day and had been doing so for more than 4 years and 7 months at the end of 2022.

In 2022, she managed 6,944,393 steps covering 4,962 km averaging 19,078 steps daily and 133,546 steps weekly. She even counted steps wearing snowshoes on a trip to Antarctica in November.

The **Region 4 meeting in The Hague** at the beginning of November provided plenty of opportunity for MOTION. There was both walking and cycling to get to the AWC clubhouse and events elsewhere, and not just by the local members. Michelle from AWC Brussels rode her bicycle to events. Had the weather been better, she would have loved to bike from Brussels to The Hague but this time the bike traveled on the back of her electric car. On Sunday morning, member Georgia led a guided walk through the Park Clingendael, a beautiful area not far from the clubhouse, and following the meeting, Rozanne from AWC Antwerp and Ann Marie from AWC Finland walked around Antwerp together, and met Shweta from AWC Berlin along the way. FAWCO connections are fabulous, especially in MOTION.

The **Region 5 meeting in Vienna** in mid-November also provided some MOTION. On Saturday, twelve participants walked 3.2 kms and on Sunday, four walked 4.85 kms. It was a great way to see the city.

The **Interim Meeting in Luxembourg** in May also made time for MOTION. The 34th annual Austrian Women's Run, which Bev from AWA Vienna has participated in the past, was held on May 22nd during the Interim Meeting. Since the start of Covid, participants have been allowed to do a virtual run, so Bev organized a virtual FAWCO team for a run/walk of 5 km on Sunday morning for those who had not yet left the Interim Meeting. It was Bev's 10th year of participating, and we neither wanted her to miss out nor do it alone. Fortunately, the hotel was in an area of hiking and biking trails, so we were easily able to do the virtual run. There was also a short walk in the same area before the start of meetings on Friday morning, and a city walking tour on Sunday afternoon.

FAUSA regularly reports members' activities on their Monthly Motion Day, the 5th of each month, from venues including city parks, neighborhoods, mountains, swimming pools, waterside and beaches, semi-desert, golf courses, tennis courts, airports, and cruise ship decks. Activities reported included walking (both on and off treadmills, and sometimes accompanied by dogs), hiking (both muddy and dry), running (often on beaches), cycling, swimming, golfing, dancing, aerobics and water aerobics, yoga, sightseeing, and playing pickleball, and one FAUSA member walked with another member AND biked on the same day. One member walked to and from Margaritaville, but didn't mention the starting point, or whether she stopped for Margaritas before the return trip. Although there was no organized MOTION activity at the Getaway this year (other than walking in a museum), three member participants went out for a morning walk together and clocked almost 9 miles. The total reported by FAUSA members for 2022 was 590 miles.

FAWCO is looking forward to another year full of MOTION in the clubs, and Clubs in Motion is looking forward to hearing about it in order to share the information via the monthly News in Brief.

The Human Rights Team continued its regular schedule of meetings in 2022. Agendas and notes are available for all meetings. 16 Days of Activism Eliminating Gender-Based Violence. We encourage every FAWCO Member Club to promote awareness and education and take action via this United Nations backed campaign. The Team offered a fresh 16 DAYS Toolkit with extensive resources in 2022. Further, clubs may choose their own (more convenient) timeline for the 16 Days of Activism, which are traditionally November 25 to December 10.

The Universal Declaration of Human Rights is marked on December 10, the final day of the 16 Days.

In February 2023, the Team will host a book discussion for *In The Time of Butterflies* by Julia Alvarez to reflect upon the fictionalized real-life story of the Mirabal sisters who were murdered in the Dominican Republic in 1960 on orders from dictator Rafael Trujillo. The date of their murder, November 25, is now the United Nations "International Day to Eliminate Violence against Women" which kicks off the 16 Days campaign.

Another important date in the Human Rights Team calendar is the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women, which is held each year for two weeks in March. In March 2022, the theme of CSW 66 was "Climate Change, Environment, and Disaster Risk Reduction: Gender Equality at the Center of Solutions," a fitting theme as the FAWCO community began thinking about the next Target Project. Since the pandemic, the events and meetings have been held online or in hybrid mode, so Laurie Richardson, FAWCO UN Liaison, held a training session for our members to explain the different types of sessions, e.g., official CSW meetings, side events, and parallel events, such as the NGO CSW Forum, and how to get the most out of the wide variety of sessions available. Many of our members attended CSW events for the first time and heard from speakers around the globe. The theme for CSW 67 to be held in March 2023 is "Innovation and technological change, and education in the digital age for achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls."

Members of the Human Rights Team endeavor to raise awareness and encourage action on Human rights themes in their FAWCO Clubs and by partnering with other organizations in their local areas. Global events related to human rights for women and girls include:

- One Billion Rising (February 14)
- Women's History Month (March)
- International Women's Day (March 8)
- Commission on the Status of Women at United Nations, NYC (March)
- 16 Days of Activism Eliminating Gender-Based Violence
- Universal Declaration of Human Rights (December 10)

Human Rights encompasses every one of the United Nations 17 Sustainable Development Goals for 2030, and uses SDG #5 Gender Equality as its visual logo.

FAWCO Youth Program



Launched in 2013, the FAWCO Youth Program's mission is to promote cultural understanding and raise awareness of global issues in our youth and help them develop into responsible and caring global citizens. Our main module, the Cultural Volunteers Program was held in Amsterdam.

The American Women's Club of Amsterdam successfully hosted the 2022 edition of the FAWCO Youth Cultural Volunteers Program from June 25 to July 2. This was an especially exciting event after two postponements due to the pandemic. During the one-week itinerary, 15 Cultural Volunteers ("CVs"), aged 15-18, hailed from 11 clubs and traveled

from 11 different countries (Belgium, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Italy, Scotland, Sweden, Switzerland, UK, and the US), stayed with local host families and immersed themselves in a variety of enriching activities which were designed to provide insights into important global issues and Dutch culture while offering them opportunities to give back to the local community...all whilst making new friends and having a ton of fun.

The CVs volunteered at Plastic Whale Boat; Canal Clean-Up / deKloof Men's Day Shelter; Cooking for the homeless / Speeltuin; rehabilitate children's play area, and Social Housing sites, Amsterdam Noord; Gardening and Beautification. They also experienced first-hand accounts with a WWII Holocaust Survivor and refugees, and learned about human trafficking and sustainable fashion.

The participants reflected on their experience through a group video and individual essays, available on the FAWCO website.

We did not receive any inquiry for the AMERICANA program (updated in 2019).

Outreach to clubs included a presentation at the Luxembourg Interim Meeting and information at Regional Meetings. Preparations are underway for the 2023 Cultural Volunteers Program.

FAWCO Target Program 2022 - 2025

Target Issue Education and Awareness

The first year of the Environment Target Program focused on broad environmental education while the selection processes unfolded behind the scenes. Alexandra Vo (FAUSA) started the education phase March 2022 - June 2022 as the Target Program Chair with Amanda Drollinger (AWC Central Scotland) taking over as Target Program Chair in July 2022. Together with The Global Issues Teams and the UN Team we put together *Target Bulletins* using the UN Sustainable Development Goals to guide the monthly topics. Along with the Environment Team, we co-hosted the second FAWCO Environment Festival, which was held on May 7, 2022 covering topics such as forming Club Green teams, local action, and Climate Justice. Also in May 2022, at the in person FAWCO IM Luxemburg, we led a workshop titled: small, medium and large ways to get involved in Climate Action (SDG 13). This was revisited at the Make a You Turn Region 4 Meeting in The Hague in November 2022 with Mary Adams, AWC The Hague, creating a "green sheet" from the ideas of the breakout sessions. Along with the Environment Team We formed the Environment Team Film Club virtually screening a range of films focused on Climate Action.

Target Project Selection started March 23, 2022 with the release of the Application Packet. The TP5 selection process was a two-phased approach with the due date for the Phase I information on August 31 and the due date for the Phase II information on November 3.

Seven project proposals were received by the August 31, 2022 deadline:

- Awesome Blossoms: Edible Fresh Fields for Sustainable Life in the Slums, a project of Safe Spaces Organization, submitted by Leslie Janoe, AWC Amsterdam
- DAKTARI Spark Igniting Environmental Opportunities for Girls, a project of Daktari Bush School & Wildlife Orphanage, submitted by Mary Adams, AWC The Hague;
- Empowering "Raizal" Women in Providencia Island, Colombia to Foster the Use of Rainwater for Food Security, Poverty Alleviation, Landscape Restoration (Natural Springs) and Climate Resilience, a project of Fundación Providence, submitted by Milena Mejia-Sampe, AWC Bogotá;
- Indigenous Women Farmers Creating a Sustainable Future in Coastal Bangladesh, a project of BARCIK, submitted by Mary Manning, AWC Berlin;
- Love for the Sea, Empowering Indigenous Women through Coral Restoration, a project of Caribbean Coral Restoration Center, submitted by Robin Goldsby, AIWC Cologne;
- Solar Learning for Women in Kenya, a project of Solafrica, submitted by Carol McEowen, AWC Bern;
- Wing Woman, a project of Stand for Women, submitted by Monica Jubayli, AWC Lebanon.

A nine-member Target Project Selection Committee representing a cross section of FAWCO with members from a number of FAWCO regions, representing numerous interest areas of FAWCO and The FAWCO Foundation was appointed by the FAWCO President, Emily van Eerten (AWC The Hague):

- Tharien van Eck, Target Selection Chair, AWC Antwerp;
- Amanda Drollinger, AWC Central Scotland;
- Mary Dobrian, FAWCO 3rd VP: AIWC Cologne e.V.;
- Angie Aebersold, Foundation VP Programs; AWC Bern;

Each proposal was evaluated in Phase 1 and rated in four areas: The Project (30%); Sustainability (25%), The Organization (15%) and Project Budget/Funding (30%) and in Phase II in three areas: Organization Overview (30%), Organization and Project Accountabilities (40%) and Fundraising, Awareness Raising and Promotion (30%). The task of the selection committee was to select a shortlist of three projects to present to FAWCO Member Clubs.

The three shortlisted projects, as determined by the selection team, were:

- Awesome Blossoms: Edible Fresh Fields for Sustainable Life in the Slums, a project of Safe Spaces Organization, submitted by Leslie Janoe, AWC Amsterdam
- Love for the Sea, Empowering Indigenous Women through Coral Restoration, a project of Caribbean Coral Restoration Center, submitted by Robin Goldsby, AIWC Cologne;
- Wing Woman, a project of Stand for Women, submitted by Monica Jubayli, AWC Lebanon.

The shortlisted projects were announced on January 9, 2023 via a Special Target Bulletin, on social media and through the FAWCO website. Project summaries were made available to members to learn more about the projects. Following the announcement, the Selection Committee provided feedback to applicants whose projects were not shortlisted.

On February 1, 2023, ballots were sent to all FAWCO Representatives for them to cast a vote on behalf of their club by February 15, 2023. The new Target Project will be announced at the Biennial Conference in Bratislava on March 24, 2023. The Target Project Fundraising will officially begin at the Biennial Meeting in Bratislava with the FAWCO Foundation launching a fundraising campaign for the Target Project.

US Issues

US Liaison Report



The US Issues Team is composed of three groups - Citizenship, Tax & Banking and Voting – whose primary purpose is to educate and inform FAWCO membership of the rights, as well as responsibilities, of a US citizen living abroad. The US Liaison also helps to coordinate FAWCO's work with other overseas advocacy organizations and represents FAWCO's positions in Washington DC when legislation is drafted or introduced that directly affects Americans living and working overseas. Overseas Americans Week has been on hold since the COVID-19 pandemic and subsequent security concerns in the capital buildings since the events of Jan 6, 2021. We are hopeful to resurrect this active

week advocating for all overseas US citizens in the coming future.

Following are the activities of the respective sub-committees of the team.

US Citizenship Committee Report

Requirements for admission to the US were the major topic for US citizens living abroad. At the beginning of the year, negative COVID-19 tests and proof of vaccination(s) were required for everyone entering the US by air. By the end of 2022, however, such restrictions were eliminated for US citizens and lawful permanent residents. Adults who are not US citizens or lawful permanent residents need to provide proof of at least two doses of a COVID-19 vaccine. An attestation for children ages 2-17 who are not fully vaccinated requires that they will be tested within 3-5 days after arrival. They do not have to be quarantined.



The requirement for REAL IDs has again been postponed until May 7, 2025. Many members use a state driver's license as identification to board a domestic US flight or entrance to certain federal facilities. Members need to make sure their US licenses are in compliance by this date as an older valid license may not be a REAL ID.

US Voting Report



2022 saw an unusually important mid-term (non-Presidential) election in the US. FAWCO's US Voting Committee, like many other Americans, warned that the future of

American democracy was on the ballot. More voters than usual for a mid-term turned out, from within and outside the US, and democracy won – but the struggle will continue for the foreseeable future, as described in this <u>article</u>. All US voters everywhere should remain ready to play their part.

In 2021–2022, members of the Committee encouraged and assisted registration and voting in FAWCO, their Member Clubs and wider communities, often working with other local expat groups and/or the US consulate or embassy. The Committee published <u>18 articles</u> on the FAWCO website in 2021–2022, regularly contributed to FAWCO publications such as *News in Brief* and the *US Liaison Bulletin*

(https://www.fawco.org/us-issues/us-issues-news/u-s-liaison-bulletins), and posted on social media. FAWCO recorded and posted a video workshop (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=H-Pc4pWU3to) in August, featuring the Committee Chair and a guest from the Federal Voting Assistance Program (FVAP). In addition, the

Committee Chair regularly communicated with Committee members and answered questions, as well as speaking at the 2022 Interim Meeting and commenting on the draft updates of the Federal Post Card Application (FPCA, the form that overseas voters use to register/request a ballot) and Federal Write-In Absentee Ballot (FWAB) and urging Committee members to do so.

Thanks are due to many groups and individuals that enabled the US Voting Committee to do its best. These include:

- FVAP (www.fvap.gov), a US government agency, and the US Vote Foundation (https://www.usvotefoundation.org/), a non-governmental organization, which regularly supply authoritative information and support, as well as nonpartisan online forms for voters to register/request ballots;
- the FAWCO Board, particularly President Emily van Eerten (AWC The Hague) and 1st Vice-President Ann Marie Morrow (AWC Finland), US Liaison Johanna Dishongh (FAUSA) and the FAWCO Web Team, for contributing good advice, moral support and especially technical support to enable the Committee's communications;
- The FAWCO Foundation Board, for making voting by American women the theme of Foundation Night at the Interim Meeting; and
- all members of the US Voting Committee for their passion for and their efforts to promote and assist voting by every overseas American.

The Committee could do its job better in upcoming elections if all FAWCO Clubs were represented on it, rather than a bit over half.

US Tax and Banking Report

Ann Birot-Salsbury (AAWE Paris) and Tracy Moede (AWC Hamburg) stepped in as Co-Chairs in Summer 2022.



The primary focus of the Tax and Banking Committee continues to be reducing the "fear factor" by making information and support available. The Tax and Banking Committee provides confidential support and encouragement, perspectives on how others are handling these issues, and suggestions for "Go To" banks, where available. We correspond

handling these issues, and suggestions for "Go To" banks, where available. We correspond with members regarding banking issues, loss of overseas accounts, tax questions, tax advisors, estate planning help, etc. Members are always encouraged to seek professional help and to comply with reporting requirements to the federal authorities.

The US Tax and Banking section of FAWCO's website has undergone a comprehensive review and now has the most current information on such topics as filing deadlines, IRS links, FATCA/FBAR, DC advocacy, tax, financial and estate planning resources for internationally mobile US Persons overseas.

Goals for 2023

- updating web page content on specific topics;
- assisting Clubs in organizing Tax and Banking Seminars.
- encourage FAWCO members to become more active in their overseas financial situations through articles in the US Liaison Bulletin and Facebook posts to the FAWCO members Private Group.

Goals for Overseas Americans Week (OAW) 2023

supporting the argument that for Americans residing overseas (i) the FBAR filing threshold should be
raised, e.g. from foreign financial account aggregate value of \$10,000 to \$50,000 like IRS Form 8938
(Statement of Specified Foreign Financial Assets); and, (ii) we should not be required to report our
accounts located in our tax-base country that hold the funds needed to pay taxes and bills, save for
retirement, pay mortgages, receive salary, etc.

Administrative Committees

Archives Committee Report

The reports from the Archives Committee for the last two years basically said that "because of COVID-19, the work of the Expatriate Archive Centre (EAC) came to a halt as far as FAWCO archives were concerned." But during this dormant period, the EAC did migrate to a new archival system, AtoM or "Access to Memory." This new archival system is now in place and the office can once again be fully manned by staff and volunteers. The basic indexing of FAWCO's materials is thus in its final stages, but the work has not been easy. One of the reasons for this is the GDPR Rules in Europe that must be followed. Once the indexing is completed, the scanning can begin.



However, this final process is extremely expensive and FAWCO has to decide how to proceed from here. Emily van Eerten had a meeting in early January with the EAC Director, Kristina Racine, and the archivist responsible for FAWCO's archives, Myrthe Korf. Besides learning about the new process that EAC is using, they discussed the cost of the scanning, which will run in the thousands of dollars.

EAC has offered €2000 towards this project, and they are willing to approach this in several ways, depending on FAWCO's priorities. Our scrapbooks would be our first priority, but before that, we must get some quotations on the professional scanning.

Bylaws Committee Report



The Parliamentarian serves as the Chair of the Bylaws Committee. This year, the FAWCO

Board, in consultation with the Counselors, decided to propose two changes to the Bylaws. The Bylaws can be amended at any Annual Meeting and Member Clubs must be advised of these proposed changes three months in advance of the Meeting.

Notice of the two proposed changes was given on December 20, 2022, and they will be presented for a vote of approval at the Biennial Conference in Bratislava March 23-26, 2023. The first proposed change would allow the FAWCO Treasurer to reside in the United States at the time of election. This change will give FAWCO the possibility to have a US-based signatory, enabling it to continue to conduct its business with US financial institutions. The second change would delete a reference to an outdated fiscal practice in relation to FAWCO Annual Meetings.

AWC London

2022 was truly a spectacular year of growth for our club.

AWC hosted **345** activities run and organized entirely by our members. In addition to our weekly and monthly activities, we hosted special events such as an evening at Glyndebourne Opera Festival and a trip to Royal Ascot! We made changes to our Monthly Mingles to make it more inclusive by rotating venues throughout London, moving to an evening time slot featuring various speakers or an activity, and nibbles/drinks free of charge. And last but not least, we launched a partnership with London & Capital as sponsors to our Women's Salon series. Our first installment was an evening at Jaeger-LeCoultre's flagship in November, exploring the historical role women have played in watchmaking.

Philanthropically, we **exceeded our fundraising goals, raising £10,000** for our partner charities The Ronald McDonald House and the Soup Kitchen. Thanks to our membership's generous giving, we were able to sponsor a named room at the Ronald McDonald House for another year! In addition to our financial support, members donated a total of over 200 hours to our charity partners.

We raised membership by 20%. Much of our club growth was due to our incredible volunteers. We were fortunate to have a full 14-member board, representative of our club demographics. Noteable strategic projects for the year included our implementation of Stripe as a new payment method, which grew out of concern over cancellations and increased transaction fees.

Zoom board meetings are here to stay, rotating between midday and evening. We meet in person quarterly and host biannual Board Retreats for annual strategic planning and personal development.

So based on these numbers, I hope you agree that AWC may be back to operating "as normal", but our incredible members and dedicated volunteers made 2022 far from a normal year.

The Association of American Women of Aberdeen (AWA Aberdeen) has 67 active members, including not just expatriates from the US and Canada but several other countries and, of course, longstanding members with roots in the UK. We strive to give back to the local community that has become our home away from home. Alongside donations made to local charities throughout the year, AWA members choose one charity to volunteer and fundraise for each year.

For 2021–2022, AWA Aberdeen members voted to continue the affiliation with the charity AberNecessities for a second year in a row. This local charity provides essential support to underprivileged families in the Northeast of Scotland. During the COVID-19 pandemic, demand for AberNecessities's services increased by over 900%. It provided both new and second hand clothing, furniture, toys, reading books, toiletries and food to families referred to via social workers, health visitors and educational establishments. During our two-year support of AberNecessities, AWA held social fundraising events and members actively volunteered by staffing donation days, sorting through donated items, laundering clothing and collecting donations.

We remain a very active club, hosting general meetings, activity groups, including Book Club, AWA Moms, Photography and of course our famous Bunco evening, in addition to several social events that support our charitable efforts. We regularly publish a wonderful newsletter, allowing members to catch up on recent and upcoming events. During the pandemic, the AWA had to move many events online and discover creative ways to keep members motivated and entertained. However, we are now back to our former selves, welcoming old and new members at coffee mornings, activity groups and key annual fundraising events.

In November, AWA raised over £9,000 for charity through the annual AWA Holiday Craft Fair. The event, hosted by the International School Aberdeen, was a huge success, allowing over 81 vendors to display and sell their products. There were in-person tours throughout the year since smaller groups could meet. Wild Apricot continued to be used for website, newsletter and membership management. One AWC member and two AWC member children were recipients of FAWCO Foundation Education Awards at the FAWCO May 2022 Interim Meeting. Support of two local charities continued. One charity supports scholarships for students living in remote regions of Finland, the other charity supports activities for young adults who are disabled. A larger donation was made to a support center for Ukrainian refugees currently living in Finland that helped sponsor a women's well-being day. At the December monthly meeting funds were also raised to help support the work of this support center. (Kaivo Espoo)

AWC Oslo

2022 started off with strict COVID regulations for the AWC Oslo and we were limited to online meetings to kick off the year. Over the course of the spring, regulations lightened, but participation at our meetings remained low as members got used to being social again. In June we held our annual meeting and installed our new Board.

We've seen an uptick in membership, and after the summer break we've had active participation at our meetings. In October we held one of our most popular events, sewing heart pillows for women who've undergone surgery for breast cancer (a project originally adopted after inspiration from a FAWCO Conference). November saw our ever-popular Thanksgiving meal, with proceeds going to a local organization we support: the Oslo Crisis Center.

November is always a busy month for our club, with both Thanksgiving and our biggest fundraiser, the AWC Christmas Market. We had a great weekend at the market with about a third of our members participating and vendors reporting that sales were back up to pre-COVID levels.

One big change in focus for the AWC Oslo this year has been in fundraising. We have decided to concentrate our efforts on our big events and do less at our monthly meetings. This reduces the workload for our fundraising officer and pressure on members to give at our social meetings. Most of our fundraising goes to our biennial scholarship, which supports a Norwegian resident studying in the US, usually in the areas of women's or children's health. Our Scholarship Committee was unable to award the scholarship in 2021, which is the first time that has happened since World War II. We look forward to awarding a scholarship of twice the size as normal in 2023.

AWO Moscow

The American Women's Organization of Moscow is a social club that provides a support group for North American, international, and local members that has a strong affiliation with North America. We have coffee mornings every second Wednesday as well as regular couples events, a few annual festivities, and celebrations

of US holidays. AWO Moscow communicates to members through Monday update emails, WhatsApp groups, and a monthly newsletter.

The year started enthusiastically and positively. We had a couple of coffee mornings and aimed for our first in-person AGM since March 2019, in early March 2022 ... just to be halted by unexpected national action that no one anticipated. Members departed quickly and quietly; before we knew it, just a handful of members from the once vibrant club were left in Moscow. The board made the decision to distribute all available charity funds as quickly as possible to the three charities we supported as sanctions have cut all funds arriving from outside the country. We kept members informed via our WhatsApp chat group as our Facebook and Instagram access were sanctioned. The newsletter editor also departed and we were not able to continue the monthly newsletter. All activities came to a complete halt by mid-March.

After summer the few members remaining got together and we decided to continue having coffee mornings as regularly as possible. Our membership dropped from 50 to 14. We decided not to charge any membership fee as we could not guarantee any monthly activities or gatherings. A decision to only support one of our three charities was made as we also lost the sponsorship of two of our three major sponsors this past year. Fundraising continues during every get-together with raffles and 20% of any funds paid, towards a get-together, goes to our supported charity.

We continue to pray and look forward to a peaceful future as well as our 30-year anniversary in 2023.

AWC Gothenburg

AWC Gothenburg had a challenging year. One of the biggest issues we faced is that our usual meeting venue, the Emigrant House, was forced to close. This, along with the continued impact of Covid affecting our ability to meet, has been difficult for the club to hold its regular meetings. Nevertheless, we held a few virtual meetings, including our annual meeting to hold our election, where we were able to fill the roles of membership chair, secretary, treasurer, webmaster and FAWCO Representative. Unfortunately, the remaining roles of president, vice-president, social chair, and advisor remain vacant.

We keep in touch with members through our Facebook page, and have held some events, including a couple of outdoor evening meetups, a dinner & movie, an Easter egg roll family activity, a visit to a newly opened US Christmas decoration store, and our annual December holiday carol meeting at a member's house.

Over the years, the club has kept in touch with the US Embassy in Stockholm and encouraged the Embassy to plan Consular Days in Gothenburg to serve the many Americans living in Western Sweden. Before the pandemic, they made four visits each year to the Emigrant House, where they took appointments for consular errands, saving many the cost and time of traveling to Stockholm, Oslo or Copenhagen to report births, apply for children's passports, get documents notarized, and other consular business. The club supplied a coffee table with snacks and drinks for visitors, which was very appreciated by both the consular officials and their appointments. Although this year, the Embassy made only one visit, we are hopeful that they will make more visits in the next year.

In 2022, 17 new members joined the club, and we are looking to increase our activities to keep those members engaged. Our club will turn 75 years old in 2023, and hope to be able to celebrate. Five years ago we had a 70-year celebration dinner at a restaurant with 29 attendees. We face challenges, but we do not want to give up!

AIC Malmö

The American International Club (AIC) Malmö is located in the south of Sweden and currently has 167 members, 73% of whom are US citizens. In total, the club represents 25 nationalities. Its aim is to bring together Americans and other international expats residing in Sweden to gain companionship, support and friendship among the members. The club celebrated its 25th Anniversary during 2022.

The AIC Malmö runs activities, several of which have an American theme, throughout the year for the members. The club has regular and monthly activities: Bookworms, our book club discussions; Let's Do Lunch; Sunday Brunch; Weeknight Dinners Out; Baby and Toddler Club; and our monthly meeting at the end of the month.

Club membership is stable at 172 members.

The year started off slowly and we were still arranging digital events in January and February events due to the pandemic.

We were able to resume in-person events in March. It took a while for members to feel confident about joining events but participation is beginning to reach pre-pandemic levels.

We have organized 7 luncheons for members and guests in March, April, May, September, October, November and December.

We hosted 6 evening events. In March and April we had two book signings in connection with the release of books written by AWC Stockholm members: Catherine Pettersson, who authored *A Daughter of the King*, and Jessica Dölling Gripberg, who wrote *Stockholm - Sweden at Your Fingertips*. AAWE Paris

The Association of American Women in Europe (AAWE) had 555 members as of December 31, 2022. AAWE provides its members with a number of activities and opportunities, including social, educational, cultural, community, and family-friendly events. We also hold special events throughout the year. Some of the highlights of our Club are noted below.

AAWE Paris' regular **social activities** include "Not Just for Seniors" Lunches, "Bookniks" book group, Afternoon Film Group, Writing Group, Coffee Meet-Ups, Ladies Night Out Apéritif, "See You at 6" online meetups, and Younger Wonders (under 40) online "Power Lunch Hours." We also offer outings to various cultural events and hold relevant lectures/educational activities. Our regular **Empowered Women Series** covered topics such as Women and Girls in STEM, Taxes 101, and Positive Intelligence and You: Why It Matters and How to Build It. We have some regular annual or biannual events, such as our **Retro Spring Sale**, where, this year, the theme was cooking, entertaining, and dressing up. Members were urged to donate gently worn dressy/professional clothes and kitchenalia, such as cookbooks and linens, and could also purchase baked goods, handicrafts and the AAWE tea towel. This event provided a great opportunity for members to get together in person. Also this year, we celebrated **International Women's Day** with a discussion of the works of African-American author and social activist Bell Hooks who is best known for her writings on race, feminism and class.

This year, we launched several new events, including:

- Welcoming Diversity Work Group
- The Career Support Group (for those searching for their next career move)
- French Film Discussion Group
- Movement for Active Aging (which involves exercise classes at a member's home)
- Yarn Group for knitters, crocheters and embroiderers

In 2022, AAWE celebrated its 60th anniversary - 1 year late due to the pandemic - with both a cocktail party and luncheon for its members.

Also this year, AAWE members welcomed Rhobi Samwelly, the founder of Hope for Girls and Women Tanzania (HGWT), which was the focus of the 2020-2022 FAWCO Target Project, to Paris and to the club. Rhobi came to

Paris as a member of the first class of the Marianne Initiative, a French initiative to promote human rights defenders. AAWE members supported Rhobi's stay in myriad ways, including taking her shopping, organizing screenings of the documentary film "In the Name of Your Daughter", inviting her to take part in events in support of cancer victims, and participating in the Forum Mondial pour la Paix. Additionally, the 15 members of the inaugural class of the Marianne Initiative, including Rhobi, presented their projects to the Paris Bar Association. Later, an AAWE member held a gathering at her apartment in honor of Rhobi and the other winners of the Marianne Initiative. In June, we also gathered in Normandy to participate in the The Rochambelle 5k Cancer Walk/Run, where our honored guest was Rhobi Samwelly whose 50th birthday we celebrated.

AAWE also engages in philanthropy, and has donated to a number of charities, namely Association World Radio Paris, English Pour Tout Le Monde, Le Fil et La Main, and Gynécologie sans Frontières. The club also held a number of in-kind donation drives throughout the year, which included:

- "Clean Out your Closets!" Initiative: Members gave over €300 in clothing donations to the *Cité des Dames* for homeless women in Paris.
- Empower Women to Achieve Economic Independence Initiative: Members gave approximately €500 in professional women's (and men's) clothing to La Cravate Solidaire.
- "Donation Drive for Ukraine" Initiative: With less than a week's notice, members donated essential items for women and children refugees in conjunction with Boneshaker Donuts.
- "Personal Hygiene Product Donation" Initiative: Again with less than a week's notice, members donated female hygiene items, including 3 large boxes of period products, that were distributed to refugee women in Paris.
- "Recover and Reuse" Initiative: The majority of unsold items from the Mini-Bazaar/Retro Spring Sale almost 40 bags were donated to La Ressourcerie Créative, a non-profit association in the 14th arrondissement with a commitment to ecological enterprise and transition.

In addition to the above, AAWE focuses on FAWCO. One of our continuous goals is to make AAWE's membership more knowledgeable about FAWCO generally, not just its Target program. Although our membership continues to grow, we also experience turnover due to, for example, moves out of France. As a result, newer members may not be as knowledgeable about FAWCO. We hope to increase the knowledge around FAWCO, and then explore how we can create synergies out of that knowledge and more actively leverage that positive energy. Examples of this include advertising within FAWCO, the U40 group, environmental, women's reproductive rights and DEIB initiatives. Fundraising can only happen when people feel concerned and knowledgeable.

The club continues to maintain positive connections with FAWCO, with several members attending and participating in the Interim Conference in Luxembourg, including Pamela Combastet, who spoke about AAWE's efforts to promote diversity and inclusion, Asma Darwish, who spoke on "Finding Home" as part of the FAWCO Refugee Network. Beyond the conference, another AAWE member, Robynne Pendariès, Professional Organizer, along with the FAWCO Health Team, organized a 4-session workshop using Robynne's "Checklist To Complete LONG Before You Need It" to help people get their papers in order. Finally, AAWE also supports the SDGs - another important focus of FAWCO.

Barcelona Women's Network

The Barcelona Women's Network (BWN) has jumped from a Covid-reduced membership of 62 in January 2022 to its current 113 members from across a wide spectrum of ages, nationalities and life stages /situations, which reflects the cultural diversity and cosmopolitan nature of our vibrant city.

"A social club with a social purpose" is one of our founding principles and, following the pandemic's restrictions on in-person events, we leapt into 2022 determined to re-energize our pre-Covid activities and fundraising efforts.

We opened our fundraising programme in January with "Footprints" – an all-dancing, all-singing shoe and everything-to-do-with-feet extravaganza. This was followed, in February, by "Fashion Cares" – a hugely successful fashion recycling event with local designers and entertainment, even including a drag queen!

Treasure hunts, wine tastings, "Mi Casa es tu Casa" events and our December sensational, women-only exploration of all things female "Sense & Sexuality," collectively raised €12,729 for our local charities helping women suffering sexual violence and in other difficult circumstances: A.A.D.A.S, Avismon and Lligam Dona. We also gave a special donation to Ukrainian women and children who have arrived in our area.

Our other regular monthly activities include:

- Monthly get-togethers over either coffee or wine.
- Cultural outings to historic monuments and art exhibitions.
- One-off fun experiences e.g. to La Roca Village shopping outlet, or our Cava & Chocolate tour just before Christmas.
- Book clubs in English and Spanish.
- Heart Pillow Project stuffing pillows for breast cancer patients in a local hospital.
- Lunches and international dinners.
- Evening drinks on hotel terraces and members' homes.
- Yoga classes
- Walking in the local countryside.

We have also just launched 2 new, exciting projects: "Womens' Voices" – where women can come together in a safe space to share their experiences around different topics; and "Inspiring Encounters" – where guest speakers present a subject of interest to our members followed by an interactive session and Q & As.

BWN has also injected a new dynamism into our branding and community interaction this year in order to increase our membership and draw people to our fundraising events by:

What a year for AWC Madrid! The effort, energy, and collaborations in 2022 have been terrific, spurred by the transition to the new normal post-pandemic. Since May of this year, we have a dynamic new President and board whose motto is "guide, energize and excite". With our clubhouse open again, in-person activities restarted and allowed for a more robust activities and event calendar. 2022 AWC Madrid Highlights:

- Social events including the monthly "Out to Lunch" group, monthly Ladies Night, themed "Wine and Tapas" evenings such as: Mother and Daughter, Honoring Senior Members, Welcome Back after Summer.
- Our Bring and Buy program restarted successfully with our clubhouse neighbors participating more and more with their donations and with appreciative customers enjoying the sales and great prices (especially helpful during these challenging economic times). As our B&B manager says, we look forward to giving more to our charities now that we are getting back on our feet after the pandemic.
- Our special club library with a wide selection of books open for members to borrow and occasional book sale fundraisers.
- Our monthly book club which has been online and has launched this year also in person, providing a chance for members to participate virtually and/or at the clubhouse.
- Participation in the annual Breast Cancer Awareness Walk for a second year, which is now an annual event and fundraiser for the club.
- A Fall Membership Drive opening select activities to new potential members, including a fun, well attended, end of summer Ice Cream Social!
- A well-attended and diverse speaker and activity program that is both online and now in person as well and included fun activities such as chocolate tasting, wine tasting, an Ikebana demonstration, a clothing styling workshop with members as models, Sunday morning walks in the Casa de Campo; and presentations and discussions covering a variety of interesting topics such as: music therapy, yoga and well-being, human trafficking, author visits.
- Exciting visits to such places as a chocolate factory and El Museo Tiflológico, a very special museum for the blind, as well as to the lavender fields in Brihuega and the important Roman architectural site in Segóbriga.
- AND... the club's biggest event of the year, its celebrated annual Holiday Bazaar returned after a 3-year absence and was held at the Madrid InterContinental hotel as in the past. Attendance surpassed expectations and vendor participation and overall sales were robust and close to pre-pandemic levels.

With the return of the bazaar, club finances have improved though they still pose a challenge given the financial impact of the pandemic. Aside from the bazaar, additional fundraisers included monthly Bring and Buy sales, book sales, participation in the annual 5K Cancer Awareness walk, a FAWCO fundraiser selling scarves. The club donated to local organizations for basic needs (food, clothing) given the need and our long-term relationship with them. This year we have raised some funds for FAWCO's Target Program too.

Last, but not least, AWC Madrid has a "FAWCO team" of five women that focused this year on improving FAWCO awareness among club members and prioritizing 4 key areas: Education grants, US Issues, Target Program and Clubs in Motion. Many wonderful Clubs in Motion group walks were organized, including some at: Madrid's Retiro Park, Madrid Río riverwalk, our clubhouse's neighborhood, nature walks admiring almond blooms in Quinta de los Molinos, another in San Lorenzo in El Escorial and even a member lead cultural walk in Alcalá de Henares. Over the year, environmental information and tips were shared regularly covering climate change, food waste, clean water, and soil protection and our first FAWCO fundraiser for the Target Program was held. Detailed information was shared to the members about the education funds with an experienced contact provided for any questions. Topics important to Americans living overseas such as US taxes, voting and citizenship have been addressed over the year. FAWCO workshops were offered including Goal setting and Fundraising by the FAWCO Foundation. Other FAWCO events were enjoyed too, including some by U40 and Global Reads among others.

All in all, 2022 has been a year of reconnecting, restarting, and appreciating what we have and what we have accomplished.

AWC The Hague

The first four months of our year were dominated by preparing to host our traditional and storied Handbag Auction in person again for the first time in three years! We asked members to donate their lightly used handbags and we amassed quite the inventory of over 150 handbags! So the first order of business was sorting through our handbags to come up with 50 really special bags that we could put into an auction. We then sold the remaining bags we collected for 5 or 10 euros in our "boutique"on the day of our Auction. We had great volunteer support setting up our clubhouse for the auction and also providing delicious appetizers and Prosecco to make the day even more fun! Veteran club member, Loren Mealy, was our consummate and very experienced auctioneer. She knew the history of many of the handbags we sold, and demonstrated her professional auctioneering skills by providing interesting information and commentary while keeping the auction moving and sold all 50 handbags! In the end, we had a really fun time being together in our new clubhouse, and most of us left with a beautiful new handbag or two! We raised Euros 2,227.00 (includes auctioned handbags plus boutique sales) plus we raffled a beautiful handmade quilt donated by AWC member

Suzanne Dundas, and raised Euros 569.03. All monies raised went to support the new FAWCO Environment Target Project.

In addition to the Handbag Auction, we also provided soup for The Hague Food Bank a few times, we provided care packages for the young moms at Vliet & Burgh, and Jo van Kalveen organized a Pop up Shop that raised money for Ukrainian Refugees in The Hague. The Pop Up Shop raised Euros 728.49. Also, Georgia Regnault oversaw monthly coffees at our clubhouse for the growing numbers of Ukrainian refugees and also offered Dutch lessons to these new entrants.

Region 4 Regional Meeting

From November 4-6, 2022, AWC The Hague hosted the Benelux member clubs on a weekend of environmental awareness and FAWCO updates and programs. Our theme of "Make a You Turn" was designed to empower women to consider how we can adopt new habits for a greener planet. We welcomed 38 members and guests to the meeting from The Hague, Amsterdam, Brussels, Antwerp, Düsseldorf, Paris, Aquitaine, London, and America.

The Friday night Mix & Mingle started with browsing our information tables about eco-friendly products, FAWCO programs, and fundraising for the upcoming Target program. Our featured speaker was Chelsea Wald, AWC member since 2016. Chelsea is a science and environmental reporter who started writing about toilets more than a decade ago. Her 2021 book *Pipe Dreams: The Urgent Global Quest to Transform the Toilet* was recently named one of three finalists for the National Association of Science Writers Science in Society awards. Her book explains how a sanitation revolution can reduce inequalities, mitigate climate change and water scarcity, improve agriculture and optimize health.

Anne van Oorschot's Time to Make a You Turn presentation challenged the audience to make informed choices in our lifestyles to make the world a greener place for generations to come. Her advice was that "we don't need to totally change our lives to do things perfectly... we need billions of people doing things imperfectly to make an impact." That means starting a green footprint with one new eco-friendly habit.

Mary Adams moderated a panel to discuss if our food system is broken. Damien Taylor, owner and chef of Blockchain Burger, discussed how technology is revolutionizing the food system by linking consumers from farm to fork using blockchain ledgers. This means that a QR code on your menu will introduce you to local farmers and their crops and livestock that provided the food on your plate.

Esther van Leeuwe, owner and chef of Smaak van de Waard, shared that her restaurant food waste is 1.6%. In the U.S., the average household wastes 31.9% of their food. She attributes it to smart buying decisions with suppliers and serving only what is needed. Her overall recommendation was to eat local and know your suppliers.

Beth Massa, AWC Amsterdam member and CEO of Ozarka explained her company's complete system that replaces single-use food containers with high-quality reusable dishes, custom-designed for takeout. Beth urged us to be a part of the zero-waste revolution. Members got a taste of the action as lunch was served in her reusable takeout containers.

Michelle Ernst asked the group, "If everyone on earth lived the same lifestyle as you, how many earths would we need to support the entire human population?" She led a group in an online exercise using footprintcalculator.org to find out how our lifestyles impact the earth. Shockingly, the calculator estimated some members in the audience would need over seven new earths.

Amanda Drollinger reiterated Anne's earlier advice that we are empowered to make lifestyle changes in small, medium, and large ways. The afternoon was spent in roundtable discussions on sharing ideas and experiences on how we as individuals, FAWCO clubs and communities can make a global difference. We created a "green sheet" based on the group input as a first example of actionable change.

AWA Vienna

This year (2022) has seen the AWA members coming out of the woodwork slowly and carefully after the two years of the pandemic. Austria was again in lockdown until early spring and even so, everyone was still very cautious with very small groups meeting in the clubhouse. In late spring and summer, our Mahjong and games group, as well as a few language groups, cautiously began meeting. As soon as the weather improved we were able to have a few gatherings for lunch and tea, while our walking and running groups were in full swing outdoors.

Our membership dropped in the summer, with many people leaving and a few joining. Currently, we have 290 members. AWA Vienna has agreed to host the FAWCO 2023 Biennial Conference, and as part of our outreach to our neighboring clubs, has created a great connection with our sister club, IWC Bratislava. That connection has been fabulous as we get to know the members who are just a short train ride away, and who have been a huge help with the Biennial Conference.

Since reopening the clubhouse in September, we have had many in person events: welcome tea party, Christmas Market, cookie decorating, and a Christmas party. Many of our events have been in person, including our weekly meetings, coffee gatherings, wine nights, yoga, walking and running groups. We also have events like Trivial Pursuit or Quiz Night online as charitable events. In December, we raised 1800 EUR in donations to our Give a Gift project, which benefits children in need. AWC Berlin

AWC Hamburg

The American Women's Club of Hamburg had a fantastic year! We saw the return of most of our in-person events, which was a welcome change given these past few years. After losing some members due to the pandemic and moving back to the USA, our membership numbers have rebounded to almost 200 members this year.

In the first half of the year, we held several successful in-person events, including the Annual General Meeting, an Easter brunch and get-together for families and children, a Spring Brunch for our members, and a Fourth of July celebration at BallinStadt, a former emigration station in the Port of Hamburg. Our members also participated in a 60-day virtual fitness challenge through 18 national parks, monuments, and seashores. We had 63 participants - including 45 members - walk, run, cycle, swim, and row for a total of 18,530 miles. As a result, we focused on hosting Social Hours in different neighborhoods throughout the year. Our groups within the club (e.g., Film Group, Currents Magazine, Book Club, Opera Club, Art Group, Walking Groups, German Practice Circle, Harbor Explorers, Mahjong Group, Photography Group, Theater Group, and Stitch 'n' Bitch) have remained active with mainly in-person meetings.

Charitable activities continue to be a pivotal part of our club. Our support of our local charity Hanseatic Help e.V. became even more important this year with the war in Ukraine. AIWC Casablanca (AIWCC) has about 85 paid members with about 65% Moroccan and the rest American or International. All meetings and events are held in English.

- Fiers et Forts- (kitchen equipment) 30,000 (\$3000)
- Dar Lamima-(kitchen refurbishment boys center) 45,000, (\$4500)
- Ass. Prise en charge-(fitting out classrooms) 40,000 (\$4000)
- Silsila-(two multi-media rooms for preschool) 50,000 (\$5000)

The total of the above donations equaled 435,000 Dhs (\$43,500 Dhs).

The AWC started the year with a plan to focus on Continuity, Well Being, and Building Connections. In 2021, the Club experienced a slight dip in membership due to a reduced presence in Nigeria as a result of the pandemic which led to members repatriation back to the USA. For 2022, the Club wanted to ensure that it established the AWC as a source of stability, continuity, and support to its members. In

2022 marked two big anniversaries for The FAWCO Foundation: 50 years of Education Awards and 25 Years of Development Grants. We are very proud of the fact that during those years, we disbursed \$1,100,000 to fund 357 Education Awards and \$635,500 to fund 169 Development Grants!

At the virtual portion of the Interim Meeting in March 2022, the Foundation Board gave a presentation detailing many ways that we have helped women and children in the areas of Education, Environment, Health and Human Rights. It was educational and gratifying for us to look back and see what we and our predecessors have achieved.

In the second part of our presentation, we recognized a large number of our current generous donors, both clubs (specifically AW Surrey, AAWE Paris, AWG Paris, AWC Genoa, AWC Bern, AWC Hamburg, AIWC Cologne, AWC Amsterdam and AWC Berlin) and individual donors (specifically Shirley Kearney, Renuka Matthews, and Donna Erismann). It was also fun to delve back and learn more about FAWCO leaders who have been honored for many years including Gertrude de Gallaix, Dr. Frieda Bacigalupo Natali and Pam Dahlgren. We further recognized some very special donors: Sami Bitar, Elizabeth Cole Carpentieri, and the Coughlan family.

We were beyond thrilled to receive an extremely generous donation from the Coughlan family which will support an Education Development Grant for many years to come. We cannot thank them enough!

The FAWCO Foundation website remains visually exciting and user-friendly. We continue to add and edit content and are excited to see that visitor enthusiasm has increased in an almost post-COVID year.

I have become more confident in managing the content. The learning curve has, indeed, flattened. Catherine Conner (AWC Hamburg) still remains the rock behind the website as the TFF webmaster. Her help and advice have been immeasurable.

The additional website page planned for 2022 will be unveiled in 2023. It will highlight the charms that have been offered since the 2009 conference in Vilnius. These charms commemorate each FAWCO Biennial Conference and Interim Meeting as well as each of the Target Projects; proceeds from the charms support The Foundation's programs. They are an important part of the Foundation's fundraising history and need to be documented.

The NEWS continues to be a cornerstone for communication for The Foundation. Constant Contact, the website used to produce and distribute the NEWS, remains our platform. Our publication is sent quarterly, bringing our subscribers information that is useful, timely, and entertaining. The NEWS seeks to keep FAWCO members informed about The Foundation, including details regarding the fundraising activities at the annual conference/meeting, Education Awards and Development Grants, fundraising for our programs, current and new programs and initiatives, and other valuable information for our member clubs. Anyone who wishes to receive the NEWS can sign up on the Foundation homepage.

I continue to review and update over 600 email addresses of NEWS subscribers, deleting nonexistent and bouncing emails, including emails whose owners have not opened an issue of NEWS for over five years. I have continued writing and editing the handbook I began in 2019. This handbook offers detailed step-by-step instructions for the jobs and work processes for the communications position. The learning curve can be steep for someone with very little website experience, like me when I first took over this position. Hopefully, this will make future transitions easier and less anxiety provoking.

The FAWCO Foundation Friends closed Facebook group has been the social media platform of choice and has been greeted enthusiastically by its membership. Posting by group members has increased and has led to better dialogue and exchange of information. The Foundation public Facebook page, Instagram and Twitter, however, continue to lag far behind the closed Facebook group regarding our reach. Admittedly, FB is a closed group whereas the FB page, IG and Twitter are open to the public and sensitive information is not posted to these accounts.

I continue to use the graphic design website, Canva. I have improved on the basic skills I had acquired in a four-hour workshop and Canva's exceptional program has been very beneficial in maintaining the dynamic appearances of the Foundation website and our Facebook presence.

Our yearly costs for website hosting, Constant Contact (our email program), and IT support (Cat Conner) have been consistent since 2015. Of course, there are still "emergency" emails and Skype calls throughout the year which require her attention, but nothing that will explode the budget.

I have enjoyed my terms as VP Communications and truly appreciate the trust put in me by The Foundation. I have learned a great deal and look forward to using my newfound skills on projects that await me in the future.

The funds financed three scholarships for Maasai girls who would not otherwise have access to education and also provide reproductive and menstrual health education to 380 students at the MaaSAE Girls Secondary School in Tanzania.

VP Fundraising

Fundraising in 2022 – emerging from our virtual world back to in-person fundraising!

IM and Foundation Night 2022

We were once again able to hold a live Foundation Night at the Interim Meeting in Luxembourg in 2022, albeit in May! Details follow.

This year's theme was *Celebrate FAWCO Fun and Friendships!* There was nothing more appropriate as everyone was ready to party! With the amazing DJ ChiQa spinning tunes, there was a festive atmosphere as the Silent Auction, Live Auction and 144 Envelopes fundraiser ran throughout the evening. We danced until midnight with Rozanne van Rie even encouraging the wait staff to join in! All told, we raised an astonishing \$48,035 – the third highest Foundation Night total ever. The funds raised go to support the programs of The FAWCO Foundation.

Live Auction: The plan was to offer up three items rather than spend too much time on the auction at Foundation Night. However, two other donors approached us with offers we couldn't refuse. Our five fabulous items: a stay in De Haan from Rozanne van Rie, a traditional favorite; a villa in Rougemont, Switzerland from Anne Riz; a chalet in Wengen, Switzerland from Patricia Aeby; a villa in Crete from Kim Slattery; and a four-day curated trip in Dubai from Monica Jubayli. Our wonderful auctioneer, Sandy Gogel (AWG Paris), was a master as the bids climbed! And our donors were incredibly generous as Patricia, Kim and Monica all agreed to offer their places to the two highest bidders and Rozanne offered her place to the highest three! The Live Auction alone raised \$29,100!

Silent Auction: Carol-Lyn McKelvey again worked tirelessly with her partner, Julie Meyerson, and successfully ran the auction on the OneCause platform. She was able to gather virtual and physical items, many of which were brought to Luxembourg. We opened the auction one week before Foundation Night, sold 120 items and raised \$8947.

144 Envelopes: We continued the 144 Envelopes event during Foundation Night which had been running since the start of the Interim Meeting. Our expectations were high; we didn't raise quite as much as we had hoped but it was a good learning experience. All in all, we raised \$4177. Some envelopes had vouchers for prizes hidden inside – the winner could choose a small cloth bag (the cute reusable bags were generously donated by Aurora Silvestri - FAUSA) and receive a prize. The prizes were donated by Aurora and The Foundation Board and included some of our dwindling Backing Women stock. The leftover bags were sold at the Region 4 and 5 meetings with funds then going to Target.

Benefactors: The Benefactors program continued on OneCause with a focus we adopted from the virtual days that "We can all be Benefactors!" A banner ran continuously on OneCause recognizing those who made a donation on the site. Benefactor donations started at \$20.00, and we raised an impressive total of \$1905 with 16 donors. We are grateful to all our donors.

Charms and Bracelets: We stayed with the same supplier, Monterey Company (Bend, Oregon) so kept our costs low. Sales from this year's charm, CELEBRATE FAWCO Fun and Friendships, raised \$740.

Friendship Quilt Raffle: The 2022 quilt – The Bluebird of Happiness - contained 118 squares donated by 32 donors from 15 clubs and FAUSA. The quilt was revealed at the Region 5 Meeting and tickets were immediately

available on OneCause. The lucky winner was Hollie Nielson (AWC Central Scotland). We raised \$3911 in ticket sales.

Foundation Night Miscellaneous: We used the "Victory is in the Vote" posters and sashes left over from 2020! We even sold two of the posters to add to our fundraising efforts. We used the sashes to decorate the tables in addition to the balloon bouquet centerpieces designed by Angie Aebersold.

Target Program

Target 4 - The incredible grand total raised for Target 4 when it ended March 31, 2022 was \$177,413.25.

Target 5 - Although we were just in the awareness-raising phase in 2022 and were not actively fundraising, donations have already come in for the as yet unnamed Target Project in the amount of roughly \$20,000. I have to mention Amsterdam's "Share Your Gifts for Good" event which raised almost \$10,000.00 in November for Target 5.

As stated in last year's annual report and in the Deep Dive, It appears that 21 Member Clubs have not donated to the current Target Project. As we head into Target 5, it might be prudent to reach out to those clubs to see what might resonate with them and inspire them to donate.

Regions 4 and 5 Face to Face Meetings

Backing Women (BW) Boutique and Raffles: We are winding down on physical items as the logistics of transporting and storing them is no longer feasible. At these meetings, we sold umbrellas, SDG pins, soaps and fans. We also sold leftover goodie bags at Region 5 and held a BW jewelry raffle at each meeting. Between Backing Women sales, the sales from Mary Stewart Burgher's earrings and the sales of Tharien van Eck's cards and art, we raised over \$2400 for Target 5. What an amazing start!

The 2023 Friendship Quilt, Life Lines, was revealed at the Region 5 Meeting with tickets immediately available on the OneCause site. The drawing will be held in Bratislava.

General Fundraising

Hope is the Thing with Feathers, the book published several years ago when FAWCO hosted an anti-trafficking symposium, is still available online with proceeds going to the Human Rights DG, Breaking the Cycle.

Giving From the Heart: We decided to rebrand the Giving From the Heart Campaign to see if we could generate more interest.

Other

Rep and RC Calls: The calls with the FAWCO VP Membership and FAWCO President's Liaison have not continued as smoothly as in previous years. We should continue to work with Kanika, the current President's Liaison, to ensure we remain part of these calls for the Presidents, Reps, RCs and Philanthropy heads. Additionally, if FAWCO continues to hold Regional gatherings virtually for the Region's Presidents, Reps and RCs, the VP Fundraising for TFF should be included.

Fundraising Analysis: The ongoing database spreadsheet contains the data for the past several years and will continue to be maintained.

Recommendation: My strongest recommendation would be that the VP Fundraising and the VP Communications work together to facilitate sharing of information regarding the work of The Foundation through Facebook and Instagram. This would be simple to implement.

The Foundation Archive:

It's a big job but we feel we have made great strides this year. The project will continue until all documents have a proper "home" and until all folders are as complete as possible.

Treasurer

The following pages include the financial statements for the FAWCO Foundation for 2022, with a comparison to 2021. The Foundation accounts are reviewed each year by an independent certified public accountant (CPA). Each review is done in the following year, so the latest letter, reporting on the independent review for 2021 is attached.

Summary: The Foundation is in sound financial condition.

The Foundation had \$461K of cash assets at the end of 2022. \$175K is restricted funds and \$286K is unrestricted funds providing a solid financial basis from which to continue to drive and support the Foundation's programs. In 2022, the Foundation had income of \$209,348 and made disbursements totaling \$138,146. The year-end result is an increase in net assets of \$71,202.

Balance Sheet

At the end of December 2021, the Foundation had total assets in cash of \$461K.

The Restricted Fund (\$175K) comprises two elements:

- Temporarily Restricted Funds (\$165K) representing donations from donors who have specified that the funds be used for specific Foundation programs (Education Awards, Development Grants and the Target Program) beyond the current year's end with some disbursements to be made over several years into the future.
- Restricted Endowment Funds (\$10K) are donations collected in the past in response to a call to establish an Endowment Fund. There has been no activity related to this Fund in recent years.

The Unrestricted Fund (\$286K) also comprises two elements:

- Board Designated Reserve Funds (\$124K) established several years ago to provide a safety net to ensure the Foundation's programs would be funded for at least 2 years without any external donations.
- Unrestricted Funds (\$162K) is everything left after deducting the restricted and reserved funds from the total cash assets. Overtime, these funds are used to supplement EA's and DG's, Foundation Donations and expenses.

Income and Expense Statement

The Foundation is on the cash basis of accounting. This means that the income and expenses are recorded when the funds are received into, or paid out of, the Foundation's bank accounts.

There are three major categories of Income and Expenses: Donations/Programs, Fundraising and Administration.

To aid in program planning and budgeting, the Foundation's goal is to disburse funds in the year after the donations are received. With this donation information as a basis, the Foundation plans the number and level of disbursements (grants and awards) for the next year, as well as the level of additional funding that it will add on top of the donations received. The Foundation tops up the awards and grants from its Unrestricted Funds base.

As The Foundation is on the cash basis, there can be large fluctuations from year to year due to large donations received in one year that are to be paid out over several years. This is the case with certain Education Awards and Development Grants. Or Target funds collected for the last quarter of the year but not paid out until January.

Fluctuations in expenses are generally due to a change in the number or amount of Awards and Grants disbursed and timing of Target funds received and paid out.

The Net Surplus/(Deficit) in any year must be viewed in combination with the Restricted and Unrestricted Funds on the Balance Sheet to get an overall picture of the financial strength of the Foundation.

Types of income Donations

• Administered Awards

The Foundation collects donations (one donor) and distributes Education Awards (two) for The Association of American Women in Europe (AAWE). The recipients go through the same application and evaluation process that all our Education Award applicants go through. The Foundation holds the donation as part of its Temporarily Restricted Funds until the disbursements are made over the period requested. The Foundation does not charge a fee for this service.

• Award and Grant Programs Donations

There is a continuous ebb and flow of funding for Education Awards and Development Grants. As one donor steps back we have been extremely fortunate to always have another willing to step in. In addition, we continue to have some very consistent and loyal donors: FAUSA, Shirley Kearney, Renuka Mathews, AAWE Paris, AWC Bern, Donna Erismann, AW Surrey, the Bacigalupo Family and AIWC Genoa.

A second Skills Enhancement Education Award was partially funded this year by Carol McEowen, a previous recipient of the award.

Kathy Coughlan and family have very generously donated to The Foundation enabling us to offer a Development Grant in the area of Education for roughly the next 10 years. Anne Riz funded the 2022 grant for Women's Health and is supporting the 2023 grant for Educating Women & Children.

The Foundation continues to supplement the funding of the Awards and Grants programs from Fundraising activities and unrestricted funds.

• Target Project Donations

2022 wrapped up the Target Project Health with a total of \$177K going to Hope for Girls and Women Tanzania to support S.A.F.E. (Safe Alternatives for Female Genital Mutilation). It also launched the Target Program Environment. While we are currently in the selection process, we have received donations totaling \$20K for the unnamed project.

General Donations

These donations are from individuals and institutions (such as AmazonSmile and iGive) to the Foundation's General Fund which is unrestricted. Over the past three years, The Foundation received an unexpected \$38K from a very generous supporter through The Springfield Foundation (15K of that in 2022). Sadly, she has passed away.

In-Kind donations

In-Kind donations arise when an individual pays for a budgeted expense for The Foundation and does not request reimbursement.

Fundraising Income

Finally being able to hold a Foundation Night in person proved to be a huge success. Fundraising consisted of Silent and Live auctions, the Quilt Raffle, a 144 Envelopes donation drive, and the selling of a conference charm. In total, \$49K was raised to support The Foundation and supplement our awards and grants. Fundraising specifically for Target included some Backing Women Sales of older merchandise and the sale of Sustainable Development Goals pins, resulting in \$2K for Target.

Other Income

The Foundation receives a small amount of income from interest on a CD and our other bank accounts.

Types of Expenses

Program Disbursements

• Administered Awards

As stated above, the Foundation currently administers an Education Award Program for one of our member clubs, AAWE Paris. Fully funded disbursements are made to the selected recipients who have undergone the same rigorous vetting process that we have in place for all of our Education Award applicants.

Awards and Grants

\$68K was awarded in 2022 with \$64K being disbursed. We have two extended awards totaling \$8K both should be paid in 2023. Of the \$68K awarded, \$48K was funded by donors and \$20K was funded by The Foundation's use of Unrestricted Funds.

• Target Program

\$44K was disbursed to S.A.F.E. in 2022, making the grand total \$177K. The first donations will be distributed to the new project in July of 2023.

Fundraising Expenses

Fundraising expenses continue to be very low. A large portion goes to pay for OneCause, our online auction platform, the cost of which we share with FAUSA. We purchased and sold a conference charm. We have not purchased any new Backing Women Boutique items and are discussing the future of this program. The net fundraising funds are used to supplement the Awards and Grants programs, some of which are either partially or fully funded by The Foundation, as well as support The Foundation's administration expenses.

Operating Expenses

These expenses totaled \$19K in 2022 compared to \$9K in 2021. The increase is due to Board travel. After three years, we were able to attend our first conference and hold a second Face-to-Face board meeting. As compared to prior conferences and travel, these costs were quite low. Typically, there are two face-to-face board meetings each year. One coincides with the FAWCO Conference and the second takes place during the summer or early autumn.

Net Surplus/(Deficit)

It should be noted that the reported large surplus is primarily due to the significant donation from the Kathy Coughlan family, to be paid out over the next 10 years, and donations received for the new Target Project, which will be paid out in 2023. Both are included in our Temporarily Restricted Funds Balance.

Being a member of FAUSA connects members with a fellowship of returning expats who understand what it's like to come home when "home" is not the same, and when "home" can also mean a place outside of North America. A new FAUSA motto (2022), "Globally Connected, Locally Active", ties in with the opportunities FAUSA members have to meet with others in their local areas as well as continuing to participate in committees, teams and boards of our sister organizations, FAWCO and The FAWCO Foundation. The three organizations cooperate and work with one another to achieve mutual goals, while sharing the camaraderie of living internationally or having experienced the expat life.

As seen from the FAWCO club affiliations above, FAUSA's members come from FAWCO clubs around the world. Publicity about FAUSA and **outreach to FAWCO clubs** by FAWCO Liaison, Suzanne MacNeil, has led to an increase in committed FAWCO and Foundation members joining and becoming active in FAUSA. Yolanda Henry, 2nd VP Membership reported membership as of December, 2022, is at **279 annual, five-year, and lifetime members**, and includes several men.
